SACE RESULTS

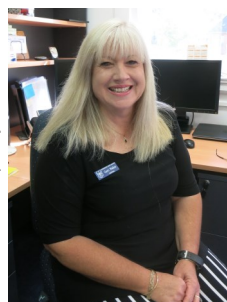
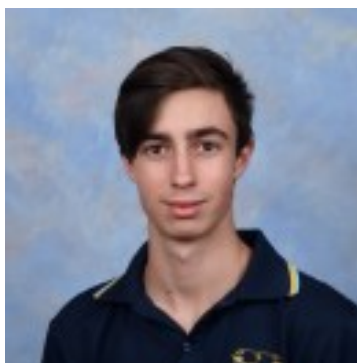
Congratulations to all of our Stage 2 students on their success in their SACE. 95% of potential completers successfully gained their SACE. 96% of Stage 2 grades were C and above, which mirrors the results from the previous year and were our most outstanding number of passing grades ever. At the Flexible Learning Centre, we had 13 students who completed their SACE (studying subjects such as Research Project, Work Place Practices, Integrated Learning, English and Community Studies) and 8 Australian School Based Apprenticeships students who finished their Research Project. Three students received As in their subjects.

Our Year 12 students have successfully achieved TAFE offers, University offers, apprenticeships and employment. We are confident that the graduates of Nuriootpa High School are well prepared for achieving whatever they set out to achieve beyond school. We are proud of every single student, and know that they will be successful in their personal destination. These results reflect the hard work from students and staff in pursuit of excellence.

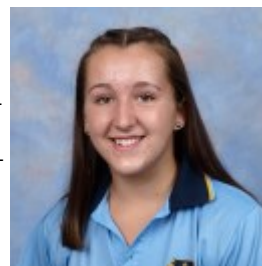

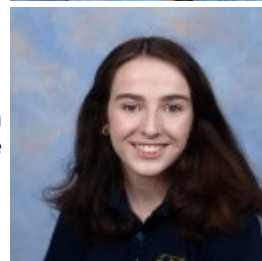

FACILITIES DEVELOPMENT

Our STEM building has opened for student learning – it is a fantastic flexible learning space. Agriculture theory lessons are now held in this building. An upstairs lab has also been redeveloped and we are awaiting new furniture before it is used – we are anticipating that it will be operational by week 4. The plans for renovations to our Home Ec kitchen have progressed and we are looking forward to this area being upgraded during 2019.

COMMUNICATION

Our Daymap system is used for communication between school and home. We encourage all families to gain access to ensure information about assessment, attendance, reporting and events can be shared. If you don't have access please email: dl.0788.admin@schools.sa.edu.au for help in getting connected.

Our newsletters are posted to our website with a notification via email and also via Daymap being sent to parents/caregivers.

REPORTING AND ASSESSMENT

Teachers provide specific feedback on nominated assessed work in an ongoing manner through Daymap (or other methods and notified via Daymap). Parent/caregivers without home internet connection can access Daymap via their mobile phone, the Town Library, or at the school through prior arrangement.

Term 1 reports will consist of progressive grades and information about work attitudes with Parent Teacher interviews conducted at the beginning of Term 2. Any concerns about progress will be followed up during the semester as they arise. We encourage families to work with their student to monitor progress and contact the subject teacher if you have any concerns or wish to celebrate good work.

YEAR 8 MEET THE HOME GROUP TEACHER EVENING 11 FEBRUARY 6.30 - 7.30

Parents and caregivers are invited to attend the meet their student's Home Group Teacher on Monday 11 February. We are looking forward to meeting as many parents and caregivers as possible to begin to build our partnership with you over the next 5 years.

BYOD4L – BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE FOR LEARNING

We have entered our fourth year of Bring Your Own Device for Learning (BYOD4L) and as a school we have invested considerable funds, and continue to do so into our program. It is now an expectation that all students in Years 8 -11 have their own personal laptop that they are able to bring to school (fully charged) because much of the Nuriootpa High School Curriculum is now heavily focussed on digital learning and digital assessment outcomes.

This year, it is a requirement for students to upload and submit assessment tasks digitally and personal laptop devices aid in students being able to do this more easily and effectively. Students are also expected to monitor their learning progress through our online DayMap software. Our goal is for all students to be connected to and engaged with digital learning. We know that when students use technology they are more likely to be engaged and motivated to learn. We want to use technology to make a difference for our students and to improve their ICT achievement in lessons.

MEETINGS WITH THE TEACHERS

We are very keen to meet with parents/caregivers about any concerns or support you need with your students. In order to do this we ask that you please contact the school to make an appointment. We are unable to ask a teacher to come out of a class to meet with you. Teachers are also busy in the mornings as they are reading notices and finalising resources for the day's lessons. Thanks in anticipation for your support in this area.

FROM THE FINANCE OFFICE

Thank you to those families that have paid the Material and Service charge of \$470 which is due Friday 8 February, or have made an arrangement to pay by instalments. **The first instalment of \$159 is due on Friday 8 February, \$159 due on Friday 8 March and \$152 due Friday 5 April.**

MATERIALS AND SERVICES CHARGES PAYMENT OPTIONS

Option 1: Pay in Full

- **Pay in full** by cash, cheque, Eftpos at the Finance Office, credit card over the phone or deposit to the school bank account BSB (105-055) Account number 233809740 using your family code or invoice number as the reference.
- **Direct Debit** – click on Direct Debit on the school website to pay in full, from your bank account or credit card. Direct Debit will need to be done for individual students.

OR

Option 2: Payment by Instalment

A Payment by Instalment form was sent to families with the Material and Services invoice in January. The form is also available on the school website. The plan has 3 set instalment dates by credit card, cash, cheque or deposit to the school bank account BSB (105-055) Account number 233809740 using your family code or invoice number as the reference. The completed form can be emailed to dl.0788.finance@schools.sa.edu.au, faxed, posted or returned to the Finance Office.

Individual payment plans can be negotiated so please contact the finance office to arrange.

SCHOOL CARD ASSISTANCE 2019

School Card covers the compulsory **\$318** of the Materials & Services Charge. Families must apply for School Card **annually** and lodge an application at the school where the student attends. Form A is based solely on the number of dependent children and income for the last financial year. Income limits have been increased for eligibility to receive school card. The gross annual income limit is now **\$59,432** for the 2017-2018 financial year for one dependent child & this income limit increases with the number of dependent children.

School Card Form A (based on income) can be applied for on line. The NHS website has a link to the online application process under School Information – Finance Information – School Card Form A.

There are other ways that you may meet the requirements to be eligible for school card assistance such as hardship, change of circumstance, self-employed, foster children and independent youth allowance. The NHS website has School Card forms required to apply for assistance under these circumstances or contact the Finance Office and the relevant form can be sent to you. If you consider that you may be eligible for School Card please complete the form that best meets your circumstance and return it to the school's Finance Office as early as possible after the commencement of the 2019 school year. If you are unsure of your eligibility and require further assistance please contact the Finance Office. **If you are found to be ineligible for School Card then you are liable to pay the Materials & Services Charge.**

CONTACTING STUDENTS DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

If a student chooses to bring a mobile phone to school they must use it appropriately and respect school policies and expectations. Phones must be turned off and not used during any lesson or structured school event. We ask that if parents/caregivers need to contact students during the day that they do so via Student Support and NOT by mobile phone or SMS - students receiving/accessing calls or messages during lessons is not appropriate and highly disruptive to teaching and learning. If a student becomes unwell during the day we require that they seek support from Student Support first of all and not use mobile phones to ask parent/caregivers to collect them. First Aid staff will assess the situation, provide care/support and if contact with home is warranted they will make that a priority.

STUDENT ABSENCES

At Nuriootpa High School, student attendance and safety is a high priority. We know that students who attend regularly are more likely to be successful at school. To support this, we would like you to inform the school about any absences of your student. This can be done via a Daymap message, email or phone call.

Students who have not attended school in Home Group, periods 1, 2 & 3 will be considered as absent for the day, and a SMS will be generated and sent to the parent/caregiver listed as number on our database. We ask that a brief response to this text message is sent to inform the school of the reason for the absence.

LEAVING SCHOOL GROUNDS

Students who need to leave the school grounds during the day must:

Have a signed diary note with an acceptable reason from their parent/caregiver

Show that note to their Home Group teacher who will sign the diary and enter details on DayMap attendance records.

Students returning to school must use the computer in the Student Support area (year 8 & 9) or the Senior Learning Hub (Year 10-12) to record their return.

Students are not permitted to leave school for the purpose of buying food/lunch down the street. Parents/Caregivers re-quests for this will not be supported. Students in Year 12 may apply for a lunch pass.

CAR PARKING

DfE only provides on site car parking for employed staff and we currently do not have sufficient spaces for all of our staff. Students who choose to drive are able to access parking in the car park located across from the school on Penrice Road. Please be aware that drop off and pick up is not to occur in the car park to avoid safety issues.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

All schools are expected to undertake emergency lockdown and evacuation drills to ensure students and staff understand and practice the procedures required to keep people safe. We have designated procedures to follow in the case of any critical incident or emergency and the safety and care of all people on site is the number one consideration. We need to ensure students understand the procedures so we will undertake regular drills and must have everyone involved taking the situation seriously.

Dear Parents/Caregivers

Re: School Closures and Cancelled School Bus and Taxi Runs on days of Catastrophic Fire Danger Ratings

A number of our school managed School Buses and Taxis will **not** run when a Catastrophic (Code Red) Fire Danger Rating is declared for the **Mt Lofty, Murraylands or Mid North Fire Ban Districts**. The SA Government/DfE policy is that schools will close, and school buses and taxis will not run, in designated fire ban districts when those districts have a declared fire danger rating of **Catastrophic (Code Red)**.

Nuriootpa High School is **not** in an affected fire ban district and **will** remain open. However, the following buses and taxis **do** travel into the above fire ban districts and therefore are **not** permitted to operate on Catastrophic (Code Red) days for that district.

While these buses and taxis are not permitted to run, students affected **are** permitted to attend school but transport to and from school on that day would be at the discretion and responsibility of their parents/caregivers.

As per our guidelines, an **ADVANCE WARNING** bulletin will be provided two days before a possible bus run cancellation.

It is possible that the CFS/weather bureau will declare Catastrophic (Code Red) at **very short notice** and it may not be possible to issue this advanced warning.

Information will also be provided via the school answering machine, website and noticeboard. It is essential that all families also monitor the media and public broadcasts and warnings associated with bushfire warning and with taking control of their own bushfire safety and preparedness. Families can also contact the parent hotline, 1800 000 279, which will operate the day before and throughout bus run cancellation periods when the Catastrophic (Code Red) level bushfire weather is forecast.

Thank you for your understanding and cooperation as we work together to keep our children safe.

KICKING GOALS SCHOLARSHIP

What is the Kicking Goals Scholarship?

Kicking Goals is a scholarship being offered by Foundation Barossa, and being supported by a number of local businesses. The Scholarship is designed for children with a disability, assisting with the last two years of schooling, and provide them with financial assistance going into further education or employment.

John Hughes himself has slight Cerebral Palsy. John is Winemaker/Owner of Rieslingfreak, and has established the Kicking Goals Scholarship. John has always wanted to put together a Scholarship that enables a child with a physical disability to go further. This Kicking Goals Scholarship builds on the success of a one off "Stump Jump" scholarship in 2010 and is designed to take children in the Barossa Valley further into education, with the ultimate goal being employment.

To date funds for the Kicking Goals Scholarship have been donated to Foundation Barossa by Rieslingfreak, Barossa Quarries and 'Riesling For Good' (a collaboration of Peter Griscti, Rolf Binder, Eden Hall Wines, Brady & Co, Vinpac, Multi Colour Labels).

The Scholarship Applications are received by a sub committee made up of Board Member, John Hughes and a third member chosen by the Foundation Barossa Board in consultation with John.

Who does the Kicking Goals Scholarship assist?

The scholarship is for children in Year 10, who have a physical disability and reside in the Barossa Valley. The Scholarship is designed to provide some financial assistance (\$500 per year) for years 11 and 12, together with John Hughes mentoring the children, focusing on further education and employment. At the end of Year 12, there will be up to \$3500 available for the child to spend on further education, educational aids or transport that may be required for the education or employment.

AUSTRALIAN WOOD REVIEW SUCCESS - STUDENT AWARDS 2018

2018 graduate Joe Cornish entered his Year 12 major project into the Australian Wood Review Student Awards. A prize pool of over \$9,000 was sponsored by industry suppliers who are keen to encourage younger woodworkers into the industry. The Popular Choice Award was presented to the student that receives the most Facebook likes / reactions.

Receiving a massive 645 votes, Joe designed and made an Electric Violin. Joe said: 'As a student of music, I have designed an electric violin to make as my year 12 major project as it is a new instrument I would like to learn. Construction techniques involved steam bending, laminating different species of timber, woodturning and shaping of timber using traditional tools such as a spokeshave.'

Joe will receive two beautiful Luban block planes, generously sponsored by Timbecon.

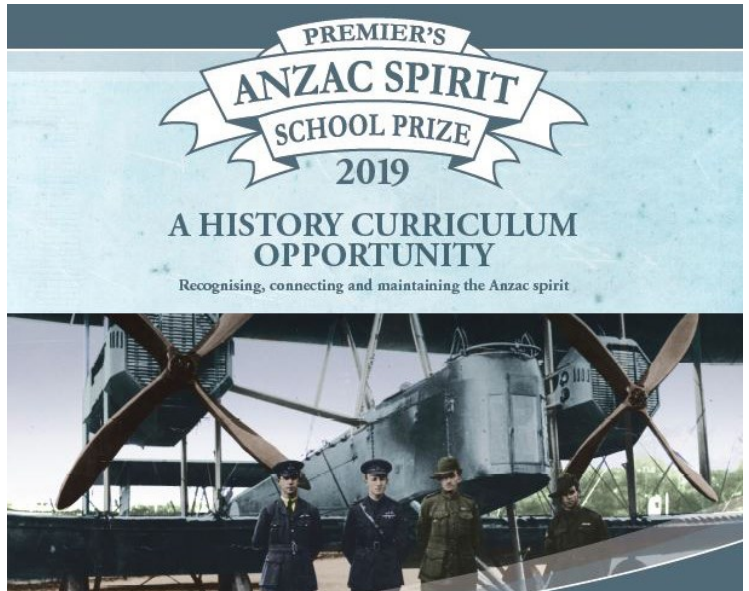

PINERY FIRE REVEGETATION PROJECT

A combined effort of Year 8 and 9 Agriculture students has led to the propagation of over 1000 native seedlings at Nuriootpa High School.

Nuriootpa High is one of eight local schools taking part in the Pinery Fire Revegetation Project, which is an initiative co-ordinated by Natural Resources Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges. The schools projects, along with other growers, will raise approximately 14,000 trees for the giveaway occurring in May at the Barossa Bushgardens. The giveaway is for helping local landholders to revegetate their land after the devastating 2015 Pinery fire.

The students are thoroughly enjoying learning about native tree propagation techniques, the importance of native trees to our environment, and love the fact that they are helping their local community with the recovery process.

PASTORAL CARE AT NURIOOTPA HIGH SCHOOL

Rose Hegarty has been employed by Schools Ministry Group (SMG) as the Pastoral Care Worker at Nuriootpa High School since 2017, and works as part of the school's Wellbeing Team to provide pastoral and practical support to all members of the school community – staff, students and families.

Rose is available to provide individual personal support (with parental consent for students), in addition to general support with curricular and extra-curricular activities – such as excursions and camps. She is also involved with a number of programs, including:

Brekkie Club – Free breakfast on Monday mornings and Thursday mornings (with Barossa Young Life) from 8.00am to 8.45am outside the entrance to Open Space. Food items are generously donated by KickStart for Kids and include toast with Marmite/Jam/Honey (from NHS bees!), eggs, fruit, yoghurt and milk. There are also Monday 'brekkie specials' such as home-made banana bread, fruit bread, 'toad-in-the-hole'. And on the last Thursday of each term, there are pancakes!

Emergency Food Relief – There is a Fruit Bowl in Student Support with fresh fruit, as well as a limited supply of emergency lunches via the NHS Wellbeing Team. Frozen ready-made meals are also generously prepared and donated by Kind-Hearted Kitchen for those within our school community in need.

Seasons for Growth – An innovative, evidence-based, small-group education program that draws on the imagery of the seasons to understand the experience of change, loss and grief.

Breakthrough – An after-school strengths-based program coordinated by the Barossa Uniting Church for NHS students.

Duke of Edinburgh Award – A self-development program offered to students at the Flexible Learning Centre.

The service is funded by the National School Chaplaincy Program (NSCP), with additional contributions from local churches.

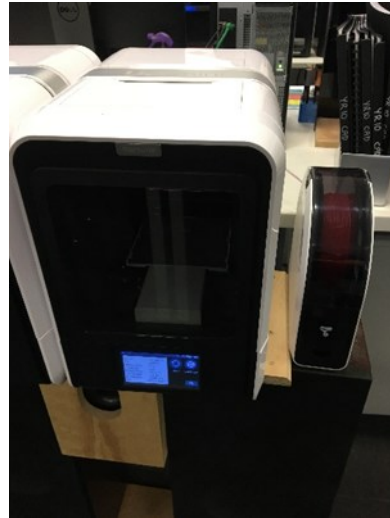

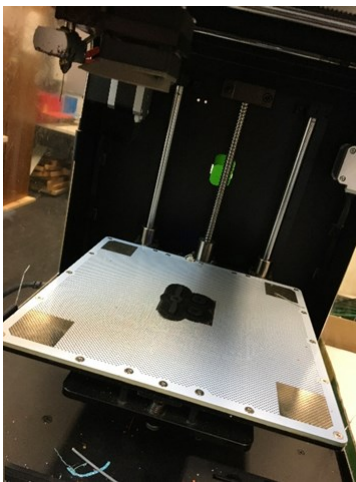
