

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Course Counselling

Over the last 2 weeks we have had the Career Expo and Curriculum Expo which were outstanding successes. These provided the opportunity for students and parents/caregivers to gain vital information to support the students to 'Discover Your Future.'

Personally I have had some ongoing conversations since the expos with students about their pathways. For some of these students we have been exploring new information together and for others it has been about providing advice. I am repeating the quote that I included in the last newsletter to reinforce an important message:

The decisions that young people make at school have a big impact on their lives – affecting not just their further education, training or employment, but also their social lives, finances and health outcomes.

We are looking forward to meeting with Years 9 - 11 students and their parents/caregivers next week in the course counselling process.

Update for Year 7 students coming to high school

Year 7 will be taught in high school from term 1, 2022. This means from 2022, year 6 will be the last year of primary school and year 7 will be the first year of high school. For Nuriootpa High School this means that we need an increase in our facilities. We are currently working with the department to increase general and specialist learning areas to accommodate these new students.

Bullying Prevention Strategy

The state government has released a statewide Bullying Prevention Strategy focused on strengthening responses to children's bullying both inside and outside the school gates. Bullying prevention requires a whole-of-community response. To develop the strategy, the Department for Education has worked with Catholic and independent school sectors, government departments and non-government organisations. The Strategy's community approach to bullying reflects community feedback, bullying prevention research and best practice.

The Strategy's initiatives include:

- Providing new bullying resources for teachers, students and families
- Training and educating teachers, students and families to increase their knowledge and ability to prevent and respond to bullying
- Increasing both compliance with bullying prevention policy requirements and school accountability
- Working with non-traditional partners, such as local councils, community services and other government departments, to prevent bullying

A partnership with Youth Affairs Council of South Australia to support student-led bullying prevention initiatives in schools. These initiatives will be implemented from 2019 to 2022.

Traffic Management

At the end of 2017, the SRC presented the Barossa Council with a petition about the road safety around the school at the beginning and end of the school days. Over the last few months, six SRC members and some of the Executive Team have been meeting with two members of the Barossa Council to progress this work. During the most recent meeting, multiple courses of action were considered and discussed for the Council members to take back and further consider. This group of students and staff will be meeting with the Council again next week to continue planning an effective course of action. *Gerri*

YEAR 9 HISTORY

Year 9 students are bringing history alive.

Students in year 9 History classes are investigating the invention of the battery during the Industrial Revolution. To do this, they constructed a battery made from a lemon, a copper strip and a zinc-roofing nail. The nail and the copper are then inserted into the lemon. When this device was connected by leads to a voltmeter, students could measure the volts produced.

The aim of the research was to put them in the position of Alessandro Volta, who invented a workable battery in 1800, called the Voltaic Pile. Students needed to explain what was happening in their own words and think through the possible explanations that Volta would have thought through as an inventor. One group stated that, "Volta would have had a similar theory as we did. He would have known that the acid in the lemon was doing something to create energy, but he did not know exactly why." It was a great group task and an interesting experiment.
