#### **SACE Results from 2019**

I would like to congratulate all of our Year 12 students from 2019 on achieving their potential. At the Year 12 graduation assembly last year the message I shared with 20/3 6.00 - 9.00 Little the students was about success and what it means. I shared that far too often we think about success as being your social status, the amount of money you are earning or your looks - we seem to idolise people of fame and power and watch their 25/3 12.40 Whole School every move on social platforms. Our students at the Flexible Learning Centre also achieved much success. Of special note were 3 students who achieved A's in Research Project and one student who achieved an A in General Maths.



At our Celebration Assembly, the male dux, Benjamin Kleinig, and female dux, Serena Lange, shared some insights with the student population.

Some excerpts from Ben's speech were:

- Firstly, try to balance your workload throughout the year, and if your subjects have exams, reserve some energy for them. Don't stop doing the things you enjoy, or drop your extracurricular activities to focus just on study. It is important to have some escapes, and you will be more productive if you keep doing these things in amongst schoolwork. If you have some time where you don't have many assignments, maybe spend some time revising something from earlier in the year or revisiting a topic you perhaps didn't fully understand. The better you understand your subjects before exams, the easier revision will be, and the more relaxed you will be heading into exams.
- For those of you who aren't in year 12 yet, I'd suggest putting effort into your work now. Don't have the attitude of 'I will try when I get to year 12' or 'I will work hard when it actually matters', because much of what you learn in the earlier years of high school is the foundation for what you learn in senior school. The more effort you put in now, the easier it will be to understand the more complicated things in year 12 and you will achieve higher as a result. I found it useful to work hard on drafts and practice tests, even though they didn't count towards my grade; and also to learn from mistakes made in previous assignments and tests, to ensure I was continually improving and achieving the best I possibly could.
- In closing, I would like to point out that obtaining a high ATAR or subject merit is achievable at Nuri High by balancing your schoolwork with the things you enjoy and completing all tasks to the best of your ability.

Some excerpts from Serena's speech were:

- We have all been successful through different strategies as everyone learns differently and studies best through contrasting ways. Find what works for you and try not to compare yourself to others. Throughout 2019 I recognised I learn best through helping other students to understand concepts and working in a quiet, isolated workspace. For other students, their studying was enhanced through working in group situations or setting long term goals. Additionally, not everyone copes well with the stress and pressure associated with high school, in particular the senior years, and that is okay. Do not think that you have to endure the challenges of education alone. The teachers and staff here at Nuri High are an amazing group of people prepared to support you however possible. Also seek support from students around you and help each other where you can.
- Education is a privilege which prepares you with the social skills, independence and resilience that will take you so much further in life than a tertiary ranking. Don't stop until you are proud of yourself. That doesn't have to come from achieving high grades. It is being satisfied with your own accomplishments, personal qualities, values you live by and decisions you have made. These last few years at high school really go fast, so make decisions that you will be proud of and not look back on with regret.
- Finally, I will leave you with some words by Winston Churchill which reflect my perspective on the importance of perseverance. 'Success is not final. Failure is not fatal. It is your courage to continue that counts.'

#### **SRC and House Captains**

At our Celebration Assembly we also presented badges to the SRC and House Captain students for 2020. These students play a vital role at our school. They give up their time to contribute to our school community while developing their leadership skills. The school community acknowledges and thanks these students for their contributions.

#### **Preparation for Year 7s in 2022**

Together with the Deputy Principal and the Business Manager, we are negotiating the facilities for our school in preparation for the 2022 arrival of our Year 7 students. We are keen to be able to share this information with the whole school community as soon as we have progressed these negotiations.

The leadership team are about to begin conversations about the teaching and learning that we will engage in with our new students. This will then extend to all staff.

There is currently some consultation across the department about staffing and how this should happen.

#### From the Finance Office

Thank you to those families that have paid the Materials and Services Charge of \$480. The M&S Charge was due to be paid by 7 February so if you have not yet paid please arrange to do so as soon as possible. If you have an arrangement to pay by instalments:- the first instalment of \$160 was due on Friday 7 February, \$160 due on Friday 6 March and \$160 due Friday 3 April.

#### **School Card Assistance 2020**

School Card covers \$322 of the Materials & Services Charge. The additional \$158 of Material & Services fee will be waived if School Card is approved. Families must apply for School Card annually. The state government has increased the income threshold for school card. The income limit also increases based on the number of dependent children.

School Card can be applied for online – please see NHS website under school information, then school finance. If you require a School Card form rather than applying online please contact the Finance Office and the relevant form can be sent to you.

Please apply for School Card as early as possible. If you are unsure of your eligibility and require further assistance please contact the Finance Office. If you are found to be ineligible for School Card then you are liable to pay the Materials & Services Charge of \$480.

#### From the Nuriootpa High School Flexible Learning Centre

In 2020 the Flexible Learning Centre welcomes more than 80 students, including students who are undertaking a range of VET courses, apprenticeships and who require flexibility around their timetables. In Week 1 it was fantastic to see 30 students who attended on Thursday. More than 20 of these students went bowling in the afternoon which was a fun way to end the first week of the year!

The FLC students are supported by 3 full time case managers from Employment Directions, 2 part time SSOs, 2 part time teachers, 3 part time volunteers and a coordinator.

There are over 20 subjects being offered from Year 9 to Year 12. A new subject being offered this year is Stage 2 Women's Studies where students investigate and analyse gender in different texts and contexts.

At the end of 2019 there were a number of different projects that students were involved with and some of these will continue in Term 1. The FLC's Wellbeing area will be completed under the guidance of our volunteer, John. A new mural will be started and the FLC garden will be planted once the summer weather has settled. One of the FLC's volunteers, Carol, who has recently joined the team, has started doing some cooking with students in the FLC kitchen. In Week 2 one of the FLC students who wants to become a pastry chef, was supported to make Chinese custard tarts, which were very much enjoyed by staff and students who were at the FLC that day!

There are students who have commenced their Stage 1 Health and Wellbeing subject with a trip to a gym in Munno Para in Week 2. These trips will continue on a fortnightly basis and are largely focused around students' personal goals and led by the gym's manager, Michael. Some of the young parents who are studying at the FLC have started a Parenting Toolkit course at the St. Petri Family Centre which runs for six sessions and is part of their Stage 2 Integrated Learning program.

Later in the term the FLC will hold a First Aid training day and there will be workshops held about Cyber Safety and positive relationships. There are also ten students who will be undertaking a Learner's Permit course at TAFE in a couple of weeks and we wish them luck when they do their tests.

The FLC team are looking forward to another positive and productive year in 2020 and wish all of our students every success.




#### **SACE Art Show**



The registration of interest for secondary school form will be **available online**.

You can access the online form from a computer, tablet or mobile phone, as long as you can connect to the internet. It replaces the old paper form referred to by schools as an ED176.

The form has a unique URL for your child and applying online is easy.

Simply follow the steps below.

- **STEP 1** From **Term 2** you will receive an email or letter with the unique URL for the registration of interest for secondary school form for your child.
- **STEP 2** Complete all mandatory fields.
- STEP 3 Once you have completed a page click on the 'NEXT' button.
- STEP 4 Once you have filled out all pages click the 'SUBMIT' button.

Paper forms will be available from your public primary school if you cannot access the internet. Parents of private school students wishing to attend a public secondary school in 2021 should email education.startingsecondaryschool@sa.gov.au for a form.

#### **Novel Coronavirus**

Dear parent/caregiver

SA Health has changed its advice to us in relation to Novel Coronavirus after the Federal Government issued an updated alert late yesterday.

The updated advice is that:

- Students/children and staff who have travelled to Hubei Province in the last 14 days should not attend school/preschool and isolate themselves in their homes for 14 days after leaving Hubei Province.
- Students/children and staff who have travelled to mainland China, not including Hubei Province, are able to return to school/preschool unless they are contacts of a confirmed case, or they have symptoms consistent with the virus.

All students and staff who have travelled to mainland China should monitor themselves for the 14 days from their departure from mainland China for symptoms of Coronavirus.



#### Moving to NAPLAN Online in 2020 or 2021

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) takes place each year for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 and has been an everyday part of the school calendar since 2008.

NAPLAN helps parents, carers and educators to see if children are meeting important numeracy and literacy standards.

The move to NAPLAN Online started in 2018. Moving online means NAPLAN is transitioning from paper-based tests to computer-based assessments.

Online testing brings many benefits and opportunities including providing better assessment, more precise results and faster turnaround of information.

#### Readiness testing activities

A critical step in preparing for NAPLAN online is schools' participation in readiness testing activities.

The purpose of readiness testing activities is to ensure your child is familiar with their device and the online test environment, as well as to test school and national infrastructure systems and processes.

Readiness testing is not another NAPLAN and will not formally assess students who participate in the test. Any reports generated will be used for testing purposes only.

Readiness testing activities may involve students who are participating in NAPLAN in 2020 or who will participate in 2021.

#### **Collection of personal information**

Schools are required by law to collect personal information about you and your child, irrespective of whether your child participates in NAPLAN testing.

The purpose of this notice is to advise parents and carers of how your child's personal information will be used for NAPLAN Online in 2020, and as part of readiness activities scheduled at various times leading up to the test in May 2020 and May 2021.

#### Disclosure of personal information

For every student participating in readiness activities and online testing, the following personal information will be uploaded by the Department for Education, as the Test Administration Authority (TAA), to the NAPLAN Online Assessment Platform ('assessment platform'):

- gender
- date of birth
- country of birth
- language background other than English
- Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander status
- parents' occupation, education and language background.

Students participating in NAPLAN Online may also have personal information collected regarding disability adjustments to enable them to access and participate in NAPLAN testing.

The personal information for students who are exempted, absent or withdrawn from NAPLAN online testing is collected and used for reporting purposes.

The assessment platform is managed by Education Services Australia (ESA). ESA is a not-for-profit company jointly owned by the Australian education ministers. ESA is subject to rigorous information privacy and data security obligations under its contract with the Department for Education and is only permitted access to student personal information for the purposes of managing the assessment platform.

Security and privacy are key requirements for the delivery of national testing. The assessment platform has been designed to comply with relevant national data security policies and guidelines, as well as data encryption standards.

ESA only has access to personal information from a relevant school, TAA or the Australian schools list for the primary purpose of fulfilling ESA's role in supporting the operation of the assessment platform.

A number of our school managed School Buses and Taxis will <u>not</u> run when a Catastrophic (Code Red) Fire Danger Rating is declared for the <u>Mt Lofty, Murraylands or Mid North Fire Ban Districts</u>. The SA Government/DECD policy is that schools will close, and school buses and taxis will not run, in designated fire ban districts when those districts have a declared fire danger rating of <u>Catastrophic (Code Red)</u>.

Nuriootpa High School is <u>not</u> in an affected fire ban district and <u>will</u> remain open. However, the following buses and taxis <u>do</u> travel into the above fire ban districts and therefore are <u>not</u> permitted to operate on Catastrophic (Code Red) days for that district.

It is essential that all families also monitor the media and public broadcasts and warnings associated with bushfire warning and with taking control of their own bushfire safety and preparedness. Families can also contact the parent hotline, 1800 000 279, which will operate the day before and throughout bus run cancellation periods when the Catastrophic (Code Red) level bushfire weather is forecast.


