## Our current 'Big Pieces of Work'

The education landscape is very busy at the moment so I thought I would share with you some of the bigger pieces of work that we are working on.

- Year 7 to High school curriculum, facilities, transition, staffing, budget.
- New Vocational Education Training (VET) changes to be introduced in 2022 - Penny Chancellor, our Assistant Principal responsible for the Senior School is leading this work and will share this information with you once it has been finalised.
- One Plans that replace the Negotiated Education Plans for students verified with a disability and Individual Education Plans for ATSI students and Students in Care. A draft of these new plans is expected to be done by the end of June. Jenelle Draper, Assistant Principal, Inclusive Education, is leading this work.

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## From the Principal - continued

- ◆ SACE Changes the SACE Board is progressing a series of key education projects that will really reframe the SACE. This includes the development of a Learner Profile, which will showcase the knowledge, skills, and capabilities of the whole student. They are working on determining the capabilities that students are entitled to develop to thrive, and how they can be evidenced, as part of a Learner Profile. They are also revitalising the Research Project and Personal Learning Plan (PLP). At this stage, they are planning a large-scale pilot of the Research Project and the PLP with specific schools in 2022, with broader roll out of the new subjects in 2023. Penny Chancellor is leading this work.
- Australian Curriculum Review over the next 4 months there will be consultation re proposed changes to the Australian Curriculum in English, Maths, Science, Technologies, Humanities and Social Sciences, The Arts, Health and Physical Education and Languages (not the languages that we teach). All teachers can contribute to this feedback. The faculty leaders will then work with their teachers to implement these changes in 2022.
- Our ongoing improvement journey with a focus on Writing for the whole school and Numeracy in Years 8 and 9 and in the Inclusive Education Centre.

## **COVID Update**

All schools in SA have a COVID Plan. This includes:

- Staff having to take home their laptop each day
- All staff and visitors needing to sign in using a QR code or hard copy daily
- Re-shared with staff the process we will use for online learning, if needed
- Identifying students and staff who do not have access to devices and/or internet at home and addressing this

## Mobile Phones Update

This policy is now becoming embedded. The number of phones being taken until the end of the day is usually around 3. Students who have their phone removed twice are expected to give their mobile phone to Mr Dickinson in the morning and collect it at the end of the day. The support from parents/carers has been very much appreciated by the school. Teachers are commenting on the positive impact that not having phones is having on students' learning.

## DayMap App

We have commenced a large PR campaign to increase the number of families using the Daymap Connect app. This includes instructions to install for first time as well as reinstalling. It will be publicised through Facebook and email. Each time a parent calls regarding attendance a reminder will be given to them. Each time a student signs out early an instruction sheet will be given to them.

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## Year 7 to High School Update

*Curriculum Planning and Student Learning* – this is ongoing faculty work. A Partnership Approach to this work will also be happening during terms 2 and 3.

**Staff Planning** - the Personnel Advisory Committee have been working on determining the teacher and SSO vacancies that we will have for 2022. We have also met with the department's staffing officers as part of this process.

As a school we are also looking at:

- leadership implications for the increased student numbers
- non-curriculum SSO implications this includes ICT, Finance, Science, Admin
- Curriculum budgets Materials and Services charges do not fully cover the Curriculum budgets

   we are considering how we will cover these additional funds with the increased number of students?
- Note that Curriculum SSOs are funded via a different bucket of funding



## Facilities Planning

There are currently 4 parts to our Facilities Planning for 2022. These are:

- 1. Year 7 to High School this comprises:
- ~ a multi-purpose building housing performing arts, music, art and physical education
- ~ a technical studies room
- ~ increasing the capacity of the Hospitality Centre

Progress with respect to these buildings is discussed fortnightly. At the Buildings Meeting on Tuesday, week 8, the following information was provided, noting that the focus is now on the Multi-Purpose Building.

We continue to ask if the Hospitality Centre can be a separable portion (can it get handed over before all of the work is completed on the Multi-Purpose Building and Tech Studies building?).

Work over the next 2 weeks will be:

- ~ Drama/Multi-Purpose Building footing excavation form, reinforce and pour slab
- ~ Tech Studies nil
- ~ Hospitality Building Structural steel external wall framing Roofing
- 2. New double room Inclusive Education facility we understand that the tender process is completed and we will soon know the successful tenderer. It is aimed to have this facility on-site early term 3, 2021.
- 3. Upgrade to our 2 Home Economics classrooms this is funded by the school. We are now going to tender for this process.
- 4. Additional 4 dual buildings to allow us to cater for the number of students enrolled at our school. These buildings will replace two triple blocks of classrooms, of which we have only been able to use one of these as a classroom. We are unsure when these buildings will be delivered as they are currently being used as part of the 'decanting process' at other schools while their new buildings are happening.

## Rate of Work vs Planned

Current works are tracking OK, however there may be a lag between the slab being poured and structural steel being erected. The shop drawing process has pushed out the fabrication of the steelwork.

**Budget Planning for 2022** – the Business Manager has begun a draft budget for 2022. Topics that we are currently looking at are:

- ◆ ICT requirements for the new buildings this includes a conversation about data projectors vs TVs.
- Establishment grant for the new 8 classrooms. As part of modular building projects the school will receive a furniture allowance of \$4,200 per classroom. Wireless Access Points and Air Conditioners are provided as part of the building scope of works. We will need to pay for TVs/projectors any other items needed.
- Working with the groundsmen on re-locating their 'office area'
- Storage once transportable buildings moved

**School Community** – the Barossa Partnership is developing transition plans to be discussed at the partnership meeting in week 9. During weeks 7 and 8, we visited local feeder primary schools. Exstudents from each primary school accompanied us on our visits and did an amazing job.

**Capacity and ceilings in 2022 -** the school enrolment capacity for 2022 is 1368. Nuriootpa High School is recommended to have the following enrolment ceiling provisions for 2022: Year 7: 228 students Year 8: 228 students.

In closing, I would like to say a big thank you to the whole school community for your support during this term. Working together makes the biggest difference for our students. We look forward to a productive Term 2 where all students achieve their potential.

New information from Australian Immunisation Register

♦ Adolescents that have previously received a dose of meningococcal ACWY prior to 14 years of age are required to have a further dose of meningococcal ACWY vaccine in order to be classed as up to date on the AIR.

Please note: This information differs from information on the school consent cards, that were printed before the changes, that indicated the Year 10 dose was not required if a previous dose had been given.

## Wellbeing and Engagement Collection - Survey of all students

Students in our school have been invited to take part in a survey being conducted in Term 1 2021. This letter provides key information about the survey.

Our school will participate in the Term 1 Wellbeing and Engagement Collection which will be open during Weeks 8 to 10 (Monday 15 March to Thursday 1 April 2021).

## Purpose of the collection

Young people's sense of wellbeing is an important part of how they learn at school. The purpose of the survey is to seek students' views about their wellbeing and their engagement with school. Students in year levels 4 to 12 across the State will be invited to participate in the *Wellbeing and Engagement Collection*. The information collected will help the education system and broader community to support young people's health and wellbeing.

## What is the survey about?

The survey asks students about their social and emotional wellbeing; school relationships and engagement and learning in school; and physical health and wellbeing and after school activities. Students' answers will be kept confidential – no one (including school staff) will use the results to identify individual students.

## What is involved in project participation?

Teachers will arrange for students to undertake the survey during class time. Students will be asked if they would like to participate and will be free to withdraw at any time. *If you do not want your child to participate, please contact the school as soon as possible after receiving this letter.* 

## Will students' information be kept confidential?

The department takes measures to ensure students' personal information and their identities remain anonymous when participating in the survey.

Participating schools with fewer than 5 students undertaking the survey will not receive a school report in order to protect the confidentiality of students.

## What will happen if a student is distressed during or after the survey?

Whilst the survey questions are not expected to distress students, the survey includes questions that ask about topics such as students' happiness and experiences of being bullied. Teachers will inform students that:

- if they find the survey uncomfortable or distressing, they should leave the survey screen immediately
- that it is not compulsory to take part in the survey as a whole, and
- students may also skip individual survey questions if they wish.

Students who may want to speak to an adult about concerns or issues and will be supported to do so.

There are also many community supports including Lutheran Care (non- profit inclusive support), Food Bank (a \$40 voucher can buy \$80 of supplies).
