Facilities Update

The latest information re our build is: Hospitality Centre (HC)

- ~ First fit services should be complete next week
- ~ Wall and ceilings is the next part of the project
- Access road completed

Multipurpose Building (MPB)

- ~ Brickwork will commence next week

Technical Studies (TS)

We have also been informed that the whole school has to have a new security system.

Additional Classrooms

The department has approved 2×4 classroom buildings to replace the 2×3 classroom buildings that have not been used due to their condition. The existing 2×3 buildings will be removed during the July school holidays. The sheds adjacent to these also have to be removed before the holidays.

New Dual Disability Unit

During the April school holidays the department discovered that they have tendered the building bigger than the existing building so this will impact on the amount of play area between the two buildings and the new building will 'jut out towards the carpark' so the fence on the Eastern Oval side will remain aligned.

Curriculum Planning and Student Learning

This is ongoing faculty work and will be a focus of this term's Pupil Free Day. In weeks 4 and 7 of terms 2 and 3, some primary school teachers will join secondary teachers in faculty areas to further continuity of learning.

Teams Meetings with Feeder School Primary Students

Over the next few weeks, the secondary school students who have previously visited the feeder primary schools with a teacher, will hold a Teams Meeting with the same students. We are looking forward to hearing the questions from the primary school students.

Governing Council

Our Governing Council has written to all primary feeder school Governing Councils to share information with them and ask if they have any particular needs for their parents. We are awaiting feedback from the primary school Governing Councils.

Australian Curriculum Review

The Review includes revisions to all eight learning areas (English, Mathematics, Science, Humanities and Social Sciences, The Arts, Technologies, Health and Physical Education, and Languages), as well as the three cross-curriculum priorities (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Cultures, Asia and Australia's Engagement with Asia, and Sustainability) and the general capabilities, such as Critical and Creative Thinking. From the Australian Curriculum Consultation website.

The Review looks to improve the Australian Curriculum by refining, realigning and decluttering the content so it focusses on the essential knowledge and skills students should learn and is clearer for teachers on what they need to teach.

The consultation closes on Thursday 8 July and you can have your say via the Australian Curriculum consultation website.

SACE

The SACE Board is revitalising - they express 'thrive' as the learning entitlement of every student. In the last newsletter I shared with you the six elements of this change. Schools have been invited to connect with the SACE Board to transform the SACE and achieve the vision of thriving learners. Our school is part of 2 of these projects:

- Capabilities this is a project based on identifying the capabilities students are entitled to develop to thrive, and how they can be assessed
- Revitalisation of the Research Project (RP) and Personal Learning Plan (PLP) this project is aimed at supporting students to thrive through their SACE and their post-school pathways

VET – an excerpt from the department's website

The VET for school students policy, released in term 4, 2019, sets out the government's strategic direction and plans for reforming how VET is delivered in schools. It aims to clearly articulate pathways to employment, embed career education in school and provide for quality VET, designed with industry, to better prepare students for the world of work.

The policy includes a number of reforms to support students to transition from secondary school to meaningful employment or further education.

We have co-designed the initiatives within the policy with industry to prepare students for the realities of the workplace, and provide a pipeline of skilled workers for South Australian employers.

At the Governing Council meeting in Week 3, Penny Chancellor (Assistant Principal SACE and VET) shared the current information about these changes. Tarnya Eggleton (Chairperson, Governing Council) also shared information she gained at the recent forum for Governing Council chairs. As more information is provided, we will share with you. It will be part of the counselling process for those senior school students who wish to access a VET course.

Validation of School Registration

On Tuesday 18 May we participated in a School Registration Audit. During Term 1 we had to provide preliminary information to the Registration Board and then the board visited the school to obtain further information. We will receive the outcome of the audit within the next 4 weeks.

Internet Speed

I received an email during the school holidays from the Department for Education stating that as part of the SWiFT Fibre to Schools project, our schools' internet bandwidth allocation has been recently increased from 400Mbps to 600Mbps, at no additional cost to our school.

Thank you for your ongoing support of our school – our partnership is critical in enabling all students achieve their potential.

2021 Snow Trip

Unfortunately we are unable to run the trip,

we hope to get there in 2022.

Governing Council met on 11 May with some of the items discussed including:

- **Traffic on roads adjacent to school** The Working Party met with Minister Stephan Knoll and Ashton Hurn to observe the current concerns about the traffic outside of the school. Minister Knoll and Ashton Hurn are following up with the local council.
- Learning Focus of the Meeting was about the changes in SACE and VET as noted on page 3. This resulted in some interesting discussion from the members who are very keen to gain additional information particularly about the VET changes.
- Year 7 to High School the council discussed the information shared above and also considered some budget implications of the 3 different building projects that are happening at the school.
- SRC Report The students shared the five focus groups that are operational within the SRC. These are:
 - ~ Student Voice Group
 - ~ Blue Gums Group
 - ~ Water Fountain Group
 - ~ Bins and Recycling Group
 - ~ Wellbeing Group.

There was an interesting discussion about recycling and bins and the students were keen to take back some of the ideas raised by the council members to the SRC.

The SRC have been busy! We'd like to welcome the following year 8s into SRC: Ryley Skarstrom, Henry Fechner, Harrison Schultz and Elsi Kingston. These students have already made their presence felt, sharing wonderful ideas and a lot of stories! Thanks for joining us!

Mr Hall and Miss Perry recently read and attended a talk about *The Resilience Project*, and feel that strategies in this book to improve gratitude, empathy and mindfulness could really benefit the SRC students. We have all undertaken a *gratitude journal* practicing the skills of being appreciative and mindful of our actions. Each day we reflect on *things we appreciated today* and *what went well for us*. We plan to follow the whole of SRC's progress, and share these results with the rest of the school.

This term we have divided ourselves into focus groups, to ensure that we are reaching the best outcome for our goals! Each group is named through it's focus on an end goal.

Recycling: We'd like to improve the recycling systems in the school, and improve rubbish in inappropriate places. This includes looking at colour coding or clearly labelling bins, and looking into options for recycling systems for plastic bottles.

Student-Voice/Fundraising: We'd like to work on improving connectivity with the larger school cohort. We aim to increase accessibility to the SRC through an online suggestion box, and improve our feedback from within the school community.

Water Fountains: As one of our major goals for the year, we'd like to look at increasing the amount of water fountains at school, and aim to increase our sustainability at school. There are a range of different styles of water fountains, and we'd love to look into ones that count how much plastic we are saving by refilling drink bottles. We plan on researching cost, practicality and working with the school community for placement.

Blue Gums: After a successful revegetation project last year, we'd like to continue with our work in the Blue Gums to make it more accessible to students and teachers. We're researching into creating pathways through the Blue Gums, surveying teachers about the potential uses of the Blue Gums and communicating with a range of school staff to create practical solutions to implementing it's use in the curriculum.

Wellbeing: Our school has recently had a big focus on student wellbeing. We'd like to look into creating some programs to support student wellbeing, such as SD activities including sport, meditating and inspirational talks. We will also be in charge of creating a survey to track the SRC's opinions about *the gratitude journals*, and creating evidence we can share with the school.

We can't wait to share all of our ideas with the school community, and create practical approaches to improve our school!

Bus Consultation

Julie Flatman (SSO Bus Coordinator) and I met with personnel from head office re their review of school buses for 2022. This review has taken into consideration all of the primary schools in the area and projected enrolments from these schools to Nuriootpa High School in 2022. There is now consultation about possible new routes. Part of the review process includes some new buses and some current buses with increased capacity. No final decisions have been made.

The review has determined that changes will be required, in relation to the following bus services in 2022:

Vineyards: Projected enrolments for 2022 show 23 new eligible year 6 and 7 students requiring use of the current contracted 57 seat bus. This bus is projected to be over capacity by 15 in the Stockwell area, therefore the contracted Dutton/Truro bus is proposed to stop in Stockwell to pick up the additional eligible students in the area.

Dutton/Truro: Projected enrolments for 2022 show 6 new eligible year 6 and 7 students requiring use of the contracted 57 seat bus. The route is proposed to travel an additional 2 km (4km p/day) into Stockwell upon its return to NHS in order to pick up an additional 15 eligible students in this area. This would take the number of eligible students on the bus to 55.

Angaston: There are 4 buses that travel through this area and these are all projected to be at or above capacity for 2022. It is therefore proposed that an additional 43 seat bus is instated that would travel a loop through Angaston to collect 33 eligible students. The bus would then return to NHS via Penrice, in order to collect 9 eligible students.

Sedan: Projected enrolments for 2022 show 14 new eligible year 6 and 7 students requiring use of the yellow departmental 43 seat bus. It is proposed that the size of this bus is increased to 57 seats. 4 eligible students disembark at Angaston PS leaving 53 eligible students travelling to NHS.

Tanunda: Projected enrolments for 2022 show 191 eligible students requiring use of a bus in this area. The current capacity of buses that service Tanunda will not meet this demand. It is therefore proposed that the small 24 seat contracted Tanunda bus be replaced with a 57 seat bus which would continue its current route along Angas, Langmeil and Para Roads to collect 57 eligible students.

In addition to this another 57 seat bus is proposed to be instated in 2022. This is intended to cater for the additional eligible students in Tanunda that would not otherwise have a service in the area south of Angas Street and north of Jane Place. Primarily this is intended to alleviate capacity pressure and to cater for the new eligible year 6 and 7 students residing in Tanunda.

Gomersal: Projected enrolments for 2022 show 24 new eligible year 6 and 7 students requiring use of the contracted 57 seat bus. The route is proposed to be altered so that it would no longer travel a loop along Angas, Langmeil and Bridge Streets, rather it would travel from Tanunda PS, northeast along Murray Street to return directly to NHS. The proposed Tanunda buses would effectively service the area west of Murray Street. This alteration would reduce bus overlap.

Concurrently there is a proposal by the Transport Services Union to amalgamate a Tanunda Primary school (TPS) bus that services Shea-Oak Log with the Gomersal bus service. Because of this the Gomersal route is proposed to be extended into Shea-Oak Log to cater for 8 eligible primary and secondary aged students residing there. This would increase the number of eligible students on the Gomersal bus to 67. Of this number 24 would be TPS and Faith Lutheran College students. After these students disembark, the capacity of the bus would be 43 eligible students travelling into NHS.

The staff continued to work with Kymberly Louise from Learning 4 All to discuss how to target concerning behaviours in students and develop strategies to "prevent, teach, and reinforce" new positive behaviours. These strategies will be trialled throughout the term to monitor and record any positive impact and behavioural changes. In addition, a morning circle and visual schedule in Ms Maddock's class is proving effective to engage the students in their daily routine. Our aim is to present students with specific learning tasks combined with autonomy to make choices and the opportunity to reinforce achievement.

Our new building plans have been finalised and the contractors are visiting onsite ready for the foundations. Interested parents and staff have set up a Fundraising Committee to help raise the finances to purchase sensory and interactive play equipment for our new outdoor space. Two exciting and unique fundraising ventures have commenced this term. Haris Koutlakis, a screen printing artist will be working with our IEC Art Masters and Art



Crew classes to design and produce two collaborative T-shirt designs that represent our students. These will be available for purchase by students, staff and the local community. In addition a group of IEC students are currently undertaking a photography workshop run by Arlon Hall and Karina Cook. Their final pieces will be displayed as part of the SALA Festival "A Unique Focus", held at Lindsay Wine Estate. This photography exhibition will showcase photos taken by a group of Primary and Secondary students with the aim to celebrate the uniqueness of children diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder. The exhibition aspires to foster an understanding of the different ways these children see the world and promote a sense of pride and achievement for the students and their families.
