- This was the focus of the Week 8 Pupil Free Day. As I walked around and talked with each faculty in the afternoon and heard about their progress, each learning area is at a different stage in readiness for Year 7 students. All faculties are looking at how they will embed the site improvement focus of literacy (technical/Tier 3 vocabulary and writing tasks) for the Year 7s. So much progress was made on the day.
- Weeks 4 and 7 of terms 2 and 3 primary school teachers are joining secondary teachers in faculty areas.

# **Outcomes from Governing Council**

- 2021 deficit budget of \$154K was approved
- A discussion about unbudgeted items to establish the classrooms for next year resulted in agreement on a Phase 1 and 2 approach, due to the cost of \$687,000. We will proceed with the Phase 1 and monitor the Phase 2 purchases as the building projects continue.
  - The discussion re traffic concerns at the front of the school resulted in the following agreements: ⇒further follow up with Stephan Knoll and Ashton Hurn
    - $\Rightarrow$ look at Risk Assessment associated with the traffic
    - $\Rightarrow$ can we get a traffic engineer's report?
- The introduction of QKr! App for school was approved. This will be used in the school and the canteen. We will begin with using it in the canteen. A big thanks to Dianne Emes for researching and providing the Finance Committee and Governing Council with this information.

# SRC Update

The SRC have been busy working in our focus groups this term – aiming towards awesome goals and improvements within our school. Some of our focus groups have succeeding in completing some of their goals this week, with a new, online Suggestion Box available to students through the BYOD portal. This suggestion box has been created for students to have an easily accessible way to have their say in what happens around our school, and what the SRC are doing! We check the responses regularly, and are happy to report that we've already started acting upon some of the responses!



"I'm really enjoying the opportunity of meeting new people in the sports industry as well as AFL players who give me tips on how to better my football career." Jessie.




