This was held in week 2 was a great celebration for the graduating students. It was good to see the parents, ATSI students and staff at the morning tea. The students really appreciated it. One of the graduating students, Jessie Sandford presented a painting to Brooke and Nat for the Culture Club. Jessie wrote, 'I was inspired to do this piece to show my appreciation and the journey I took which has now ended at Nuriootpa High School. I really wanted to show how proud I am to have been a part of all these other young Aboriginal persons lives.'

6. Vine Inn Donation:

Chris Linden from the Vine Inn has informed me that they held their annual charity golf day last Wednesday and at their board meeting on the following evening, it was decided that they would donate to our Social Justice fund an amount of \$4,700. What fantastic sponsorship and thank you to the Vine Inn.

External School Review

There was much positive feedback about how our school has progressed over the last 3 years.

Some initial verified strengths by the External School Review Panel were:

- A clearly documented SIP guides teachers and leader's improvement work. The school's improvement plan has been refined with a narrowed focus on the development of writing: tier 3 vocab/specific features of different text types and numeracy. Most staff demonstrated in their responses how they are addressing the challenges of practice (COP) in their teaching.
- Several staff commented positively on the professional learning support provided by the school.
- Teachers and students reported an increased use of formative assessment to gather evidence of student understanding in learning: questioning strategies to illicit responses, drafts and conferencing with others referencing interim reports and student achievement data.
- Classroom visits conducted provided evidence of students positively engaged in their learning through their interactions with peers and teachers. Students interviewed identified the value of strong relationships with teachers as a key contributor to their success in learning.
- Assessment tasks have been developed using a common template for consistency of format and demonstrate some evidence of alignment to curriculum and SIP requirements.
- The final report will be available by the end of this year.

COVID 19 Update

As per the letter and information sent to parents/carers on 1 November, Nuriootpa High School has been identified as a vaccination site for 8 and 29 November. Information provided is:

- Only the Pfizer vaccine is available. They can do the 2nd dose if someone has had a 1st dose of Pfizer vaccine elsewhere.
- As a general rule there is a 7 day interval between the COVID vaccine and other vaccinations. If someone has had another vaccine and still wants to have the Pfizer vaccine, they can consider this in consultation with the Medical Officer on the day.

Facilities Update

Capital Works Project

- We are expecting the handover of the multipurpose, Technical Studies and Hospitality buildings before 23 November.
- John Gardner MP, Minister for Education will be opening these buildings and the Disability Unit on 23 November.
- Furniture and equipment for these buildings has been ordered and we expect it to be here before the end of this year.

4 x 2 Buildings

- Fleetwood's (successful contractor) mobilisation to the site 23rd November 2021
- Delivery of modules 1st December to 2nd December 2021
- Handover of buildings 12th January 2022
- We are currently doing much work around this buildings project to ensure we are ready to start on day 1 next year.

New Dual Disability Unit

- This will also be ready before 23 November for the opening.
- This building is seen as a project that is 'the way to go forward with' as a department and they are keen for the Minister to see it.

Home Ec Upgrade

• The drawings for the tender are finalised and the tender has gone out this week. It is hopeful that the upgrade will be completed during the school holidays.

Maths area - the remaining area was carpeted during the holidays.

Shipping Containers – these were re-located during the holidays to make room for the new 8 classrooms.

A new PE Shed has been erected and is located next to the Little Athletics shed.

Decommissioning Flexible Learning Options (FLO)

The department has informed all schools that the Flexible Learning Options (FLO) strategy will be decommissioned by the beginning of 2023.

The Executive Team are working with Kim Dawes (Acting FLC leader) about referrals to the program for 2022. We have asked many different sources about what this means going forward with the consistent response being 'a draft strategic roadmap towards a more inclusive educational provision for all students will be available for feedback during 2022.'

As we get more information we will share this with the school community. The Executive Team have decided to recommend the full 75 students we normally have for 2022 and determine what this means for these students once there is clarity about going forward.

Governing Council Report


At the Governing Council Meeting on Tuesday 26 October 2021:

- An Open Meeting was held to discuss the 2022 Materials and Services Charges. There were no attendees other than Governing Council members. We received 2 emails of support for the \$480 Materials and Services charge. Motion: That the Governing Council approves the 2022 Materials & Services Charge of \$480 and to proceed with conducting an online poll. Passed.
- The Governing Council welcomed Maddie Eggleton and Catrina Kellond as Acting President and Vice President of the SRC. They were supported by the current President and Vice President Cody Parham and Gemma Linke.
- The Learning Session for the evening was about the development of the next Site Improvement Plan and possible recommendations from the recent External School Review.
- The Traffic Working Party reported that they have met again with the Barossa Council who is looking at possible improvements to reduce the traffic risk adjacent to the school. They reported the meeting was positive.
- Amy Heinicke will join the Governing Council as a community member representing the Barossa Foundation. Amy is also a member of the Finance Committee. The Governing Council are very pleased to have Amy join us.
- Conversation about the playground for the Inclusive Education Centre was discussed with respect to funding and preparation for 2022.
- SRC provided feedback from the recent survey they did about Annual Student Awards with respect to how they should be determined. Governing Council agreed to set up a working party comprising 2 Governing Council members (Monique Lloyd will chair this group), 2 students from SRC and 2 staff volunteers. Gemma Linke, a current SRC member who is in Year 12 will also be on this group if she is available. They will look at whether the awards should be gender based, check with sponsors to gain clarity about the criteria and provide recommendations back to Governing Council by mid-2022.
- Flexible Learning Opportunities Governing Council to look at promotional opportunities in 2022 to demonstrate the importance of the programme to support the on-going funding of the programme.


