



From the Principal By Gerri Walker

19 Welcome to Term 3, 2022. What a term already! This week is Science Week and our students have engaged in some challenging activities. We have also had the Careers and Curriculum Expo on Wednesday which provided students and their families with invaluable information about their pathway. We have had a group of Year 10 students win the regional Science and Engineering Challenge and are now representing our school at the state level. Our sports teams have continued to be successful, and we have had some of our students represent the state in sport. 30

Some Positive Observations

With lower COVID cases on a few days this term, this has meant that I have been able to go into classes and talk with students about their work. I have also been able to do some relief lessons so that 31 teachers can complete One Plans with their students.

My observations have included:

- Differentiation with respect to the tasks when students are asked to complete a written task. For some students this involved much scaffolding, including questions to answer so that the student could write an extended response. For some students, an oral response was given using information the student had collected and developed into a PowerPoint. Some students had limited scaffolding and were responding to the feedback that had been provided by the teacher.
- The explicit teaching of tier 3/technical vocabulary. When talking with some senior students, they 13 reflected with me on how they had learnt some of these terms in their junior years in different learning areas and were able to apply them to the new context. Personally, I learnt that you can have biscuits that are 10 or 20 millimetres to join table pieces together.
- Students analysing their practical work and undertaking data, statistical and tactical evaluations, 14 and investigations. When talking with the students about their evaluations, they had also under-23 27 30 taken some deep research that they were able to share with me – they were interested in their work.
- The explicit teaching of numeracy in learning areas other than Maths. Two examples are students designing a bedroom and making the model to scale (using ratios) and the value of the different notes in Music when the students were either playing music or composing it. I also got to teach 3 Calendar on page 15) degrees and minutes in latitude and longitude to a class that I did a relief lesson for.
- One reflection I had was the engagement of our Year 7 students in specialist subjects. This included students using keyboards for the first time; students looking at developing a way to remember the names on the lines of the treble clef - developing their own mnemonic; composing and playing music for a group drumming performance (wide range of drums); students using SolidWorks (a 3D product design software); wooden chopping boards being made; students making their own soft toys and talking about the different stitches they use and cooking in the kitchen. I did not get to see Years 7s in the other specialist areas, but I regularly hear positive and enthusiastic stories about what is happening there.

This has also allowed me to observe and see some interesting work that some of our teachers are using with their students. Two Maths examples of this are:

- The Maths teacher who is teach griding points to some students who have some misconceptions by using
 masking tape on the carpet tiles in the open area and getting students to physically walk to the grid points
 and then write them down.
- The Year 10 Maths class who had to build models of a castle and then had to work out the surface area and volume. It was interesting to talk about surface area when different parts of the castle were in different positions on the models – an interesting conversation. This allowed the teacher to ask more probing questions and to extend their thinking.

It has also been exciting to hand out several Principal Awards to students who have been making much progress in their learning. Students in the senior years enjoy being recognised as much as those in the junior years.

Some Good News Stories

- During Week 10 of Term 2, 10 of our Year 10 students undertook the Barossa Australia Work Experience Program. Those students involved were extremely positive about the experience. One of the students reflected: Personally, this week helped me decide that I want to be involved in the grape growing industry upon the completion of my schooling. I would recommend this experience to anyone with an interest in the industry.
- We had some great results in our Research Project again this year. We had a total of 30 students achieve an A
 - or higher for their final grade. For many students this is a difficult subject, so it was wonderful to see those
 students who are often challenged to achieve success in this compulsory subject. Congratulations to Tanya
 Bowley and Asher Rohde on 2 of their students achieving an A+ in the Research Project.
- I want to acknowledge the work of our relief teachers, many of whom have increased their availability to support us during the teacher shortage created by COVID. We are very fortunate to have such a cohort of staff at our school.

Staffing Update Term 3

- Welcome to Steph Noske who is teaching HASS for the rest of this year. She is replacing Mark Reincke.
- Welcome back to Danny Herbst who has joined us as a grounds person from Wednesday week 1 until the end of the year.

Staffing Update for 2023

- Congratulations to Lauren Semmens who has been rolled over for 2023. Lauren will backfill the 0.4 counselling role in semester 1 behind Olivia Jones who will return 0.6 Semester 2 arrangements will be finalised during Term 2.
- Agriculture Learning Area Leader position that was advertised externally for 5 years was not filled. The position has now been advertised internally for 12 months.
- ♦ Josh Bottrall will continue with us as a permanent teacher Josh chose to relinquish the Ag Leader role, one that he has undertaken to a high standard. We are very pleased to have him continue with us as a teacher.
- The Years 7/8 Leader panel is in process.
- The Personnel Advisory Committee is now looking at any teacher positions that can be converted to permanency (the teacher must have been at our school for 3 years in the same role and a position exists at the school), advertising permanent teacher positions and appointing contracts.

Some Issues we have been addressing

- Students leaving school to go to work some senior school students have been leaving school early to do shifts. We have begun talking with these Businesses to share our concerns. Please refer to the article re attendance on page 4 newsletter.
- Movement Passes there has been an increase in damage to toilets and concern about vaping we have been asking all teachers to ensure only one student at a time is out of the classroom and they must have a movement pass. This has allowed us to have conversations with some students who have been out of the class when there has been damage done to the toilets/vaping concerns. This process seems to be having a positive impact.

Year 7 Numbers for 2023

Enrolment Packages went out to our Year 7s for 2023 at the end of last week. Our current numbers are around 225 mainstream, 10 Special Class and 3 Disability Unit students. This is an increase on our 2022 numbers.

Progress against Site Improvement Plan

At the Week 1 staff meeting, there was a focus on Learning Intentions and Success Criteria. Staff have done much work on Learning Intentions and Success Criteria, which is part of Setting Goals and Structuring Lessons.

Andrew Dickinson led a session on this with staff, sharing the following key points:

- Learning Intentions are descriptions of what learners should know, understand and be able to do by the end of a learning period or unit. They are the basis for tracking student progress, providing feedback and assessing achievement. In addition to learning intentions, students may also have individual learning goals that they address in their learning.
- Success criteria are the measures used to determine whether, and how well, learners have met the learning intentions.

Andrew shared that there is an expectation that staff are sharing learning intentions and success criteria with their students.

At the Week 3 staff meeting, Andrew led some work on Reading Improvement with a focus on 'Before Reading Happens' and Getting Knowledge Ready'. Reading Improvement strategies are often separated into ones that are Before, During and After reading. Andrew shared some work on strategies that happen before on how we prime students and get them ready to read, focusing on evidence-based strategies that, when employed across all class, will have a high impact on students' reading abilities. Staff were asked to work in cross-curriculum groups and analyse a piece of text they would expect their Year 7, 8 or 9 class to be able to read. It was great to see staff working in cross-curricula groups for the first time this year – they certainly appreciated it!

At the Week 4 staff meeting there was a re-visiting of our commitment to each Learning Area identifying and teaching the technical words/Tier 3 words for each unit of work. Students need to have a rich vocabulary that continually grows through language and literacy experiences, in order to comprehend and construct increasingly complex texts, and engage in oral language for a variety social purposes. Focussing on vocabulary is useful for developing knowledge and skills in multiple aspects of language and literacy.

Knowledge of vocabulary meanings affects students' abilities to understand and use words appropriately during the language acts of listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Such knowledge influences the complexities and nuances of students' thinking, how they communicate in the oral and written languages, and how well they will understand printed texts. Governing Council Report

Governing Council met on Tuesday of week 3. Key points were: **SRC**

- Shared how they have allocated the funds raised from Casual Days. These were: 1st Casual Day funds towards grounds water fountains; 2nd Casual Day sponsor a child; 3rd Casual Day Bush gardens donation; 4th Casual Day school projects; Term 3 Wear it Purple Foundation and then SRC expenditure; Term 4 Foundation Barossa. They shared they have not received as much funding this year compared to the last few years. We will be setting this up on Spriggy as a lot of families don't use cash anymore. Governing Council congratulated the SRC on the raising of funds and the way they are using the money.
- Discussed the projects they are working on including the purchasing of water fountains

The **Learning Session** was led by Anne Barclay about Student Wellbeing and Engagement Data. She was supported by the SRC members.

Traffic Working Party

Letters have been sent to DfE and Barossa Council requesting funding for Local Area Traffic Study work. This is the required first step in identifying safe solutions for the benefit of the school students, staff and the surrounding community.

The Barossa Council has responded offering \$5,000 and we are awaiting the next step from the Department for Education as a financial contribution for this is not something that DfE usually commit to.

Uniform

A new line of pants will be added to the current uniform offerings.



Attendance

How's your student's attendance?

A reminder that we are focusing on attendance this year because we recognise its importance in engaging students in learning and giving them the best chance of success. Students with 5 to 9 absences per term are considered habitual non-attenders and those with 10 or more absences are considered chronic non-attenders. Where does your student sit on this scale? Students with 5 absences per term fall short of the DfE attendance goal of 90%. Note that legitimate, educational reasons for non-attendance (for example, an offsite learning program such as a school-based apprenticeship or a TAFE course do not count as absences).

The relationship between grades and attendance is clear: there is a sharp decline in grades with increasing absence rates. Students with fewer than 20 days absent for the year are averaging B grades. With 45 to 60 days absent per year this average falls to a low C and above 60 days students' average grade is not reaching a pass standard.

While the reasons for non-attendance can be complex, there is no denying the correlation between attendance and school achievement.

It is a priority of Nuriootpa High School to improve our attendance rates so students can make the most of their opportunities at high school and beyond. Improving attendance is a partnership between families and school. Parents have a key role in:

- Ensuring that students develop good attendance habits from an early age
- Only permitting necessary absences and scheduling non-essential commitments outside school hours
- Where absences are unavoidable (for example due to illness that could be worsened or spread to others by attending school), informing the school in a timely way of the reason for the absence
 - ~ By phoning the school on 8562 2022 and selecting option 1 or 2 on the menu
 - ~ By creating a new Daymap message and selecting the option Send an absence notification to the school.

If we don't hear from you, you will receive an SMS notifying you of the absence. That temporary number can be used for your reply for 24 hours. Alternatively, use the phone or Daymap options or send a note for the home group teacher when your student is next at school.

Please contact your student's year level team if your student does have issues with attendance, because there is a range of supports and strategies available so we can work together with families to improve attendance. Remember, every single day matters.

VAPING/e-cigarettes

Vaping is becoming an increasing health and safety concern, particularly among young people.

E-cigarettes are battery operated and may look like: cigarettes cigars pipes pens highlighters USB memory sticks



Nuriootpa High School students receive education around the dangers of vaping in Health lessons, we have posters about the school and we are working with Encounter Youth to provide further drug and alcohol education seminars for targeted year levels this year.

Students found vaping or with vapes are subject to the consequences of our NHS Behaviour Code.

The plaque we have commissioned is still in production but will be fitted as soon as possible. The water-fountain project is still in the works as we are currently waiting on quotes, however, are expecting to install two new fountains before the end of the year.

As for the feminine hygiene products in the bathrooms, we urge the student body to please respect the items that have been supplied. They are there to be used correctly and appropriately, however, there have been several incidences where they have been misused. School Card

School Card covers **\$334** of the Materials & Services Charge. The additional \$146 of Materials & Services fee will be waived if School Card is approved. Families must apply for School Card annually and lodge an application at the school where the student attends.

The income limit chart is available on NHS website <u>http://www.nurihs.sa.edu.au</u> and all school card forms and eligibly criteria are on the following link: <u>www.sa.gov.au/topics/education-and-learning/financial-help-scholarships-and-grants/school-card-scheme</u>

The Form A School Card form is based solely on the number of dependent children and income for the last financial year. School Card Form A is available on the NHS website <u>http://www.nurihs.sa.edu.au</u> on the School Information page, where you can **apply online** or print a hardcopy. The completed form can be emailed to <u>dl.0788.finance@schools.sa.edu.au</u>, faxed, posted or returned to the Finance Office. This should be done as soon possible at the start of the year.

Form A is based solely on the number of dependent children and income for the last financial year. This may not be the correct form for you as there are other ways that you may meet the requirements to be eligible for school card assistance such as hardship, change of circumstance, self-employed, foster children and independent youth allowance. The NHS website has School Card forms required to apply for assistance under these circumstances or contact the Finance Office and the relevant form can be sent to you. If you consider that you may be eligible for School Card please complete the form that best meets your circumstance and return it to the Finance Office as early as possible after the commencement of the 2022 school year. If you are unsure of your eligibility and require further assistance please contact the Finance Office. If you are found to be ineligible for School Card then you are liable to pay the Materials & Services Charge of \$480 less the Government Rebate of \$100.

Keep Australia foot-and-mouth disease free Travelling to Australia or receiving international mail?

What is foot-and-mouth disease?

Foot-and-mouth disease (FMD) is a highly contagious animal disease that affects all cloven-hoofed animals including cattle, buffalo, sheep, goats, deer, pigs and camels.

FMD can survive in frozen, chilled and freeze-dried foods including meat and dairy products.

It is not present in Australia. An outbreak would cause sickness in animals, and greatly impact Australian meat (beef, lamb and pork) and dairy farmers.

There is no threat to human health from this disease.

What goods can carry foot-and-mouth disease?

- Dairy products and meat products containing beef, lamb and pork. These goods are not allowed into Australia from FMD-infected countries.
- Items such as clothing, shoes and equipment used on farms, in rural or wilderness areas, markets, zoos or near animals.
- · Animal skins, camping and hunting equipment and trophies.

How do I stop the spread of foot-and-mouth disease?

DON'T

- X Bring meat or dairy products to Australia in your baggage.
- X Buy meat or dairy products online from overseas sellers.

DO

- Tell family and friends overseas not to send you any meat or dairy products.
- Check biosecurity import conditions before sending goods to Australia – agriculture.gov.au/bicon.
- Clean any equipment, clothing and shoes thoroughly before you send them or travel to Australia.
- Declare and present any risk goods to a biosecurity officer for inspection on arrival in Australia or put it in a bin.
- Declare if you have visited a rural area or been in contact with, or near, farm animals.
- Avoid farms and livestock for the first seven days after arriving in Australia.

DON'T BRING OR SEND MEAT AND DAIRY PRODUCTS TO AUSTRALIA



CLEAN AND DECLARE all shoes, clothing and equipment used near animals or in rural areas



It's everyone's responsibility to help keep Australia free from FMD



Serious penalties apply if you breach Australia's biosecurity laws. You may be issued with an infringement notice of up to \$2,664. Your visa may be cancelled and if so, you will be refused entry into Australia.
