Some personal teaching reflections:

I regularly do relief lessons and Home Group sessions which allows me to be more connected to our students. With many of the Home Groups I have been doing some quick Numeracy activities. It has been interesting to see the students' responses to the activities and asking them to 28/9 Drama Performance explain why they got their answer. What a great start to the day!

One of the relief lessons I recently had was with the Year 11 and 12 English Literary Studies class - an area that it not a personal strength. However, I ended the lesson having learnt from the students. I talked with each student and heard from the Year 11 students about the texts they are currently studying and which text they will compare them to. It was interesting to hear why they had chosen the different comparative texts. The Year 12s were looking at a Paul Kelly song of their choice and then doing a transformative task - this was really interesting, especially as 25/10 6.30pm - Y7 one of the girls had never heard Paul Kelly sing 'How to Make Gravy'. She shared how she was going to do 2 diaries from 2 different perspectives. I was even more interested that the students 27/10 National School needed to do the task before they listened to it as it may impact on their work.

NAPLAN RESULTS Hopefully you will have received your Year 7 & 9 student's NAPLAN results. These were handed out during Homegroup on Wednesday morning.

Feedback from State-wide Leaders Day

On Monday 29 August, I attended the state-wide Leaders Day. The new Department for Education Chief Executive CE Martin Westwell shared the research about Building a World Class Learning System. Some key points were:

- Two common elements of successful education systems in the world are:
 - ⇒ They are unusually effective in meeting the individual needs of individual learners
 - ⇒ Education is highly valued as a path to personal fulfilment
- Parents should not be asking the question 'How well is my child doing?' but **How is the child doing well?** The latter question refers to the multiple dimensions of success of the child.
- We can't do everything we need to have clarity about our system priorities our system's purpose
- How can we achieve excellence and equity these are interdependent
- We need to be tight on what we want to achieve and flexible on how we get there
- ◆ The importance of student agency
- The three key elements have to work together
 - ⇒ Purpose/philosophy
 - ⇒ Practice capture system expertise
 - ⇒ Products supporting the change to happen
- How will we build a world class learning system we will not just focus on the academic metrics students also need to thrive.

We look forward to seeing how this work is implemented.

From the Governing Council

Feedback from Governing Council

- Traffic Management Plan the Department for Education and Barossa Council have each contributed \$5000 for this to occur. We have now been informed that the Barossa Council will lead this work of employing a traffic engineer to develop a proposal.
- The learning piece for the Governing Council was about subject selection, timetabling and budget preparation to support the council to be able to make these decisions
- Materials and Services (M&S) Charges for 2023 these funds pay for the curriculum items for each faculty and include printed and electronic materials, stationery, access to IT, machinery and equipment and materials for inclusion in the library. The M&S fees historically have not covered the cost of these items for many years.
 - ♦ The department set the M&S fee at \$355 for secondary schools for 2023
 - ♦ History of M&S at NHS:

- Of Governing Council have decided to go to a poll for an M&S fee of \$498. Parents will be invited to speak to this at the next Governing Council meeting in week 3, Term 4 and then if agreed we will go to the poll. If the poll is not successful, we will only be able to charge all families \$355 and include a voluntary contribution. The \$100 rebate will happen again in 2023 the department is not sure how they will action this yet.
- Governing Council agreed to the Tech Studies faculty purchasing a CNC Plasma Cutter for Metalwork with funds saved by the faculty this year.
- Key points reported from Building and Grounds Committee
 - ♦ Relocation of shade and benches: 8 benches have been placed around the school. We are now considering placing benches along tennis court fence line.
 - New grounds shed: quote is under budget proceed.
 - ♦ STEM outdoor area: waiting for quote.
 - ♦ Stage in Memorial Hall to be enclosed for a storage area for PE/Outdoor Ed.
 - ♦ Northern Oval: Greenock Cricket club to provide a quote for matting for the pitch.

From the SRC

This term, the SRC has been continuing with many previous projects. First and foremost, the memorial plaque for Will Miller has been installed, and the unveiling was on Wednesday, September 21, with his family in attendance.

The SRC is still awaiting quotes for the water fountain project, however, funds raised from several Casual Days are still being put towards the project, which will go ahead as soon as the quotes are received. The SRC has continued with the Blue Gums project as well, with stakes and guards having been removed from several plants from the 2020 Revegetation Project. We would also like to report that the Woodland is thriving, and students will continue visitations to remove rice millet to continue making the area easier to access and visit.

As for the feminine hygiene products in the bathrooms, we are disappointed to report that they have been removed once again from the bathrooms. The SRC has spent a large amount of time, and a considerable effort to have these products reinstalled after previous vandalism, only for students to once again misuse and disrespect the system. We urge those who are the culprits to please consider students who need the products, and who because of their actions, are now unable to use them. Sanitary products should be a right. By consistently vandalising these products, you are disadvantaging others. They are there to be used correctly and appropriately, but due to the disrespect shown to the cleaners and other students, they have been removed until further notice.

The next Casual Day was scheduled for Friday 23 September. This was not a themed day, and the funds raised from gold coin donations and the chip buckets sold are going towards the possibility of installing new shelters within the school, which will benefit not only students, but other sporting clubs who use the oval.

2023 SRC applications are now open, so keep a watchful eye out on the Student Bulletin for any further updates and, if you are considering becoming a student representative, please do not hesitate to apply. Applicants will be notified Term 4 whether they are successful.

Year 12s have three weeks of school to go, so the SRC would like to encourage you all to study hard and do well. You are so close to the end!

School Card can be applied for online – please see NHS website under school information, then school finance. If you require a School Card form rather than applying online please contact the Finance Office and the relevant form can be collected at the Finance Office or sent to you.

If you are unsure of your eligibility and require further assistance please contact the Finance Office. If you are found to be ineligible for School Card then you are liable to pay the Materials & Services Charge of \$480.

Canteen Online Ordering with Spriggy Schools

Place your canteen orders online with Spriggy Schools, this makes lunch orders more convenient for both families and the canteen. Students can avoid the queue by ordering recess and/or lunch online. A preordered collection point is available at door # 1 at the Canteen. Cut off time for on-line ordering is 9:30 am for recess & lunch.

Student Part day absences and reporting Absences

Parents and students are reminded about our Attendance Policy. (Link below)

2. Reporting absence reasons

Parents are asked to notify the school of absences beforehand and provide a reason for the absence. Planned whole- or part-day absences can be reported by writing a note to the home group teacher and sending it to school with the student. Absences can also be reported by:

- By phoning the school on 8562 2022 and selecting option 1 or 2 on the menu
- By creating a new Daymap message and selecting the option Send an absence notification to the school

Absences notified by phone or Daymap will be recorded in Daymap by an SSO.

Absences due to illness require a medical certificate if they are longer than three days.

3. Absence notifications for parents and caregivers

To support regular attendance, parents/caregivers are notified by mobile phone Short Message Service (SMS) each time their student is away from school without explanation. An SMS text message is sent to the mobile phones of parents/caregivers explaining that our records show that their student is absent unexplained on that day.

Parents/caregivers can then reply on the day they receive the message by pressing the reply option on their phone. The reply should include:

- the student's name
- · the year level
- the date of absence and
- the reason for the absence

Standard text abbreviations are acceptable for the reply, as long as the school receives the key information.

4. Part day absences

4.1 Recording student lateness

Students who are late to school must report to Student Support and sign in.

Parents/caregivers are required to provide an explanation of the lateness by one of the methods listed above.

4.2 Leaving school during the day

Students leaving school early must sign out at Student Support. Parents/caregivers are required to provide an explanation of the early departure by one of the methods listed above.

Students who wish to leave school due to illness must report to Student Support where an SSO will contact a parent/caregiver for approval and to arrange for the student to be collected and record the absence in Daymap.

We understand that there are sometimes emergencies where students are required to be collected during the day. We would appreciate as much notice as possible from parents via a call to the school or message via daymap to the Home Group teacher or school.


Senior Chemistry Excursion to Yalumba Winery



Medicare Child Dental Benefit Scheme (CDBS)

The Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) was introduced by the government in January 2014. The aim of this benefit schedule is to improve children's dental health by providing funds to cover essential dental services for eligible children aged between 2 and 17 years old. The fund covers the cost of essential preventative and restorative treatments up to a value of \$1000 over 2 consecutive years. Any funds remaining at the end of each 2 year period will not be carried over.

How Could CDBS Help My Child?

The services covered by CBDS help prevent any dental diseases, or wherever possible, will restore teeth that have been damaged due to infection or trauma. Barossa Dental will be able to work with you and your child to devise a suitable preventative dental treatment plan within the scope of the services covered.

What Type of Treatments Are Covered?

Preventative treatments covered by CDBS include your child's regular dental examinations cleanings and x-rays and fissure sealants. Restorative treatments covered include fillings, root canal treatments ad tooth extractions if we are unable to save a tooth.

Is your child currently enrolled in the scheme? Contact us to make sure they get the maximum benefits from their available funds.

Who Is Eligible For CDBS?

Children aged between 2 and 17 years old are able to be assessed for eligibility at the beginning of each calendar year for the entirety of the coming year. To be eligible, a child must qualify for Medicare and they must be a part of a family who receives an applicable government payment, for example the Family Tax Benefit Park A.
