Mental Health Practitioner

On Friday, February 10th we were notified that we have been invited to be part of the new School Mental Health Service. The School Mental Health Service has been established to help support the increasing number of students who experience mental health concerns that impact on their wellbeing and learning. It is designed to complement – not duplicate – the range of existing mental health and wellbeing services already available in schools, including Student Wellbeing Leaders, Student Support Services and SWISS. The Mental Health Practitioners will be based in up to 65 schools to support young people with mild to moderate and emerging mental health concerns. They will be managed by a new team in Student Support Services that will provide appropriate clinical governance and supervision. In practice, this means we will have a 1.0 FTE practitioner—maybe from any discipline Social Work, Occupational Therapy or Psychology at our school for 2 years. They are unsure what will happen at the end of this tenure. It is not expected to start until term 2 at the earliest – possibly term 3.

Good News/Thanks/Positive Stories

Inclusive Education Centre Playground and Lawn

The playground equipment has been installed in the Inclusive Education Centre playground area and the students are very excited to be able to use it. During week 2, three of our grounds persons worked with some students from the Inclusive Education Centre and the Young Environmentalists to lay the lawn in the playground. It was fantastic for the IEC Students and Young Environmentalists Program participants to be involved in all aspects of the planning and installation process. Students developed an understanding for landscape design, map reading and measurement, including the financial costing of the project whilst experiencing the 'hands on' practical element of laying roll out turf - skills they can use in the future.

Splash Day for Years 7 and 8

This was held on Wednesday afternoon of week 2 and was really enjoyed by all the students.

• Barossa Foundation ongoing support

Foundation Barossa has been successful in an application to participate in the Foundation for Regional & Rural Renewal Back to School Program. In addition to valued support from FRRR, they also received sponsorship from Barossa Real Estate.

The program operates through the distribution of vouchers with a face value of \$50 each to help the families in greatest need in the community, and distribute vouchers, one per student, to support their return to school in 2023.

This year the vouchers are for Kmart. They allocated 256 vouchers to Nuriootpa High School, valued at \$12,800 in this year's program and 38 vouchers to the Flexible Learning Centre Nuriootpa High School, valued at \$1,900 in this year's program.

They have also just picked up the latest batch of computers from Yalumba as part of the Yalumba Computer donation program. They have 6 for Nuriootpa High school and 2 for the Flexible Learning Centre.

Amazing generosity for our students from this Foundation – we sincerely thank them.

Uniform Sales

A big thank you to Deb Robertson and the SSO team who sold uniforms in week 0. They sold nearly \$57000 worth of uniforms – an amazing effort. This was greater than the amount sold when we had 2 new cohorts in 2022

Lockers for Year 7 Students

These have been installed on the verandahs of the Quads where the Year 7s have the majority of their lessons.

• New siren system – this was installed during the holidays and means we only have one system within the school instead of 2! There have been a few initial problems, but we are getting closer to having all of these rectified.

Site Improvement Plan (SIP) for 2023 -2024

We have had our SIP for 2023, based on the progress against the 2022 SIP, approved. We have narrowed the focus to Reading for the whole school based on High Impact Teaching Strategies and the John Munro Reading strategies. We have identified a focus area for each term:

- Term 1 Differentiated Teaching need to continue with this from 2022
- Term 2 Questioning
- Term 3 Feedback to students and from students
- Term 4 Summarising

We are asking the Maths faculty to use the same strategies but apply them to Numeracy.

As we undertake the work in each of these areas, we will develop agreed actions for teachers and document them in the Whole School Pedagogical Approach to address the External School Review Direction of 'Develop a collective understanding of high impact teaching strategies that support effective differentiated teaching and learning that supports all learners.'

At the Governing Council meeting on Tuesday 14 February, the following key elements were discussed/approved:

- Site Improvement Plan

- We have applied for 6 outdoor settings as part of a federal funding initiative
- Discussion about the mobile phone policy

- Approval of the school's budget
- Location of 7 new individual toilet cubicles adjacent to Room 13 and facing out towards the Eastern Oval
- Therapy Dog at school the proposal is that it would be for one week with the IEC students in the classrooms in IEC 1, IEC 2 and IEC 3 plus in the SC 09 for certain students to access or take the dog for a walk or be exposed to the benefits of animal therapy. This would be organised on a rotational, needs basis between recess and lunch on a Friday. The following week the Therapy Dog and provided volunteer team member would be based in the Waratah or Banksia Room. A roster could be organised for students to access the dog, go for a walk or provide the appropriate therapy for either individual or small groups of students. It would be anticipated that some individual students would have access at some stage. Governing Council agreed that this proposal could go to the school community for consultation.

School Sport



Laying Down The Lawn

On Wednesday the 8th February a bunch of us worked with Youth Worker Trent, and Groundsman Peter Burgermeister and Kim Darmody to lay the lawn in our playground and it was just such a great day.

Report by IEC 1:

In the beginning, there was a big rectangle of dirt (and a triangle). Trent made all the plans and our Cross Disciplinary Studies classes had a good look at all the work that needs to be done for a project like this. Trent had to measure the space and work out how much lawn he needed to buy and how much that would cost. Then he ordered everything we needed.

To prepare for the lawn, the area had to be made nice and level, with any rocks removed, and the ground made nice and wet.

Jake and Ethan helped to remove and roll up the bunting.

Then we added the fertilizer. Oliver used the fertilizer spreader. Trent raked it through the soil.

The lawn was delivered on pallets. It looked like layered cake.

Everyone in our class helped carry the lawn in, one roll at a time. Billy and Leon also helped. Trent showed us how to place it on the soil and to unroll it the right way.

- Step 1: Start in one corner. Line it up against the pavers
- Step 2: Roll the grass out nice and flat. Trent called this 'rolling out the Dinner Table'
- Step 3: Get another roll of lawn and line it up to touch the one before it. Make sure they are lined up nice and straight
- Step 4: Roll it out. Re-adjust if you need to. No gaps or overlapping! Sometimes you need to tuck in some edges
- Step 5: Keep going until it's all rolled out
- Step 6: Use a knife to cut lawn to fit around the drain pipe
- Step 7: Fill any gaps with smaller pieces of turf
- Step 8: Cut holes for sprinkler system
- Step 9: Stomp down on (or tuck in) any edges/corners still sticking up. Pour over the seams between patches of lawn to help it all grow together
- Step 10: Water the new lawn!

We kept carrying more rolls and lining them up ready to be rolled. When we had enough rolls in one line, we placed the rolls at the end of the space ready for a new line.

We also put the bunting back up using star droppers. It will take about a month for the lawn to settle in properly, so we had to have the bunting up to stop people walking over it until then.

Jacky's Comments:

It was a big job and we were very busy! The IEC1 homegroup were interviewed afterwards and were asked for comment. Ethan K said it was a lot of work and Antonio said the rolls of lawn were heavy. It definitely took some muscle and what the OT's would call 'heavy work'. But it was a group effort and students were surprised it all got done so quickly! When asked what they liked about the experience, these were some of their responses:

Jake - 'Teamwork'

Ash - 'Getting busy and working with my hands'

Oliver - 'Rolling out each roll of lawn'
Alex - 'Getting wet at the end'



On behalf of the IEC I would like to extend our thanks to Youth Worker Trent for including us in this process. It was meaningful and relevant, and served as an excellent introduction into our Cross Disciplinary Studies Program.

Thumbs up to all the students who took part: all of IEC1, Billy, Leon and Jaxon from SC, the Young Environmentalists, and Riley S. and Logan W from IEC3. You all deserve a pat on the back! Shout out to Trent, Peter and Kim and to everyone who supported our students in this work. Thank you to Gaynor for all the fabulous photos. Very much appreciated!

Trent's Comments:

It was fantastic for the IEC Students and Young Environmentalists Program participants to be involved in all aspects of the planning and installation process. Students developed an understanding of landscape design, map reading and measurement (including the financial costing of the project) whilst experiencing the 'hands on' practical element of laying out the turf - skills they can use in the future.
