Successes

Youth Expo

On Friday 5 May, the Year 11 students ran an expo for all students as part of their Positive Education Course. Each year level had an opportunity to attend and engage with a range of activities that were organised by the students.

Funds for Outdoor Seating

Earlier this year, with the Governing Council, we applied for \$25,000 under the Schools Upgrade Fund – Open Round for the 2023 school year. The Schools Upgrade Fund provides funding to improve and upgrade school facilities, to help keep students safe and get their education back on track after the COVID-19 disruptions of the last couple of years. The Australian Government provided this funding under the Australian Education Act 2013. Our funding was to purchase six Sheltered Park Settings so that students can undertake outdoor learning in a shaded environment. This amount of shelter would allow a full class to be engaged in outdoor learning. Currently the school does not have this facility. With Year Seven students starting at our school, this extends the flexibility of learning spaces for all students. It will greatly improve the space between the Quads and the Languages building.

Site Improvement Plan Work

Annette Ryan and I have met with all curriculum leaders to discuss 'small data' as evidence for impact of differentiation, the current focus of our improvement work. These meetings have been great and generated some interesting discussion.

At the faculty meetings in week 1, staff discussed the small data they have that provides evidence of impact of differentiation. They then discussed this in cross faculty groups in week 3.

The small data that each staff member provides will be discussed at their Performance Development Plan meetings later this term. We will then collate this across the school.

A personal example of small data is with the Year 8 Maths class that I was teaching 2 lessons per week to address Misconceptions. We did a diagnostic test at the beginning of the year. Together with the teacher I was team teaching with, we looked at evidence of how each student had progressed against identified misconceptions to provide evidence of how we had differentiated to progress the students' learning.

Facilities

- KidSafe have undertaken an audit of our new playground in the Inclusive Education Centre. We are currently addressing any identified issues.
- We are having a toilet block with 7 individual cubicles installed between the new Quad buildings and the Languages building. Work has commenced and they will be finished late July.
- Staff Car Park there has been another meeting with the project officers and they are re-considering the location of this carpark.

NAPLAN 2023 Onwards

New proficiency standards with 4 levels of achievement for each year level will replace the previous 10-band structure that covered all 4 levels tested and the old national minimum standard set in 2008 when tests were on paper. The new proficiency standards include a baseline benchmark to identify students who are likely to need additional support.

"The standard for proficiency is set at a challenging but reasonable level. If your child is in the Strong or Exceeding category, it means they have demonstrated proficiency and that their literacy or numeracy skills are where they should be at this stage of their schooling. If your child has not yet achieved proficiency, then they will either be in the Developing category or the Needs additional support category. This is powerful information in the hands of parents/carers and teachers, and will enable much more meaningful conversations between them about how our children and young people are developing the foundational skills they need," Mr de Carvalho said.

From The Principal - continued

For national reporting, 2023 will mark the start of a new time series, now that all students are online and the tests are being held in March instead of May.

This will mean beginning a new results time series from 2023. Results from 2023 on will not be directly compared with results from 2008 to 2022. Resetting the measurement scale and restarting the time series once all schools are online was a recommendation of the 2020 Independent Review of NAPLAN. NAPLAN continues to measure student achievement in numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation. The new proficiency standard will be included on all NAPLAN reporting including the National Report, the My School website, the reports received by schools and the Individual Student Reports (ISRs) received by parents and carers.

NAPLAN Individual Student Report

The numerical NAPLAN bands and the national minimum standard will be replaced by the following 4 levels of achievement:

- * Exceeding
- * Strong
- Developing
- * Needs additional support

The descriptors for each category will make it clear to parents what their child's literacy and numeracy skills are at the time of NAPLAN testing, and support discussions with their school on their child's progress. Student reports will continue to show the national average and the range of achievement for the middle 60 per cent of students in their year level, allowing comparison of a child's achievement against these measures.

We shared information about one possible aspect of this review – the Tailored Provision Tool for Students Vulnerable to Disengagement. The Tailored Provision Tool will support schools to make informed decisions about how best to support the needs of students vulnerable to disengagement from learning based on the identification of the personal barriers that the student is facing.

School Card

The Form A School Card form is based solely on the number of dependent children and income for the last financial year. The completed form can be emailed to dl.0788.finance@schools.sa.edu.au, faxed, posted or returned to the Finance Office. This should be done as soon possible at the start of the year.

Form A is based solely on the number of dependent children and income for the last financial year. This may not be the correct form for you as there are other ways that you may meet the requirements to be eligible for school card assistance such as hardship, change of circumstance, self-employed, foster children and independent youth allowance. The NHS website has School Card forms required to apply for assistance under these circumstances or contact the Finance Office and the relevant form can be sent to you. If you consider that you may be eligible for School Card please complete the form that best meets your circumstance and return it to the Finance Office as early as possible after the commencement of the 2023 school year. If you are unsure of your eligibility and require further assistance please contact the Finance Office. If you are found to be ineligible for School Card then you are liable to pay the Materials & Services Charge of \$398.

Re: Wellbeing and Engagement Collection survey

Our students have been invited to take part in the Wellbeing and Engagement Collection survey. The survey will be open in weeks 2 to 5 of term 2 (Monday 8 May to Friday 2 June 2023).

Purpose of the survey

Young people's wellbeing is an important part of how they learn at school. The survey seeks students' views about their wellbeing and their engagement with school. Students in years 4 to 12 across the state will be invited to participate and the information collected will help the education system and broader community to support young people's health and wellbeing.

What is the survey about?

The survey asks students about their social and emotional wellbeing, school relationships, engagement and learning in school, physical health and wellbeing and after school activities.

How will students complete the survey?

Teachers will arrange for students to do the survey during class time. They will be asked if they would like to participate and are free to withdraw at any time. If you do not want your child to participate, please contact the school as soon as possible after receiving this letter.

Will students' information be kept confidential?

Students' personal information and identity will remain anonymous. Survey responses are confidential and no one (including school staff) can use the results to identify individual students. Participating schools with fewer than 5 students undertaking the survey will not receive a report of results, to protect the confidentiality of students.

What will happen if a student is distressed during or after the survey?

The survey includes some questions on topics such as student happiness and bullying.

Teachers will inform students that:

if they find the survey uncomfortable or distressing, they should leave the survey immediately it is not compulsory to take part in the survey as a whole students can skip individual survey questions if they wish.

Students who would like to speak to an adult about any concerns they may have will be supported to do so.

University of Adelaide Roseworthy Campus Tour & Career Day

On Monday 22 May, 14 of our Year 11 & 12 Students traveled to the Roseworthy campus for a tour and a career day where 55 students from multiple schools, across SA attended. We began the day with a tour of the campus, looking at the facilities of the campus. This included on-campus housing & student recreational areas, sheep and cattle yards, equine facilities, the on-campus animal hospitals for both large and small animals, lecture rooms and various laboratories.

Students then gathered in the lecture room for a presentation from one of the lecturers about the Animal Science and Veterinarian degrees offered at the campus and the uni. Following morning tea, we participated in a animal nutrition session held by Dr Mariana Caetano where we did a quiz on 12 different grains and stock feed additives. We then looked through 5 different microscopes, each showing different microbes and rumen contents.

The second session was a group practical where each of us learnt how to wrap a horse's leg for simple first aid practices. The third session was learning about, and taking Electrocardiograms (ECG's). We each took turns testing each other's electrocardiography and then used it to calculate our heart rates.

The last session for the day was looking at plant technology and trials of new and innovative developments for precision agriculture, presented in a lecture room by Belinda from Ag Communications.

Lunch was then served in the student hub to end the day. Students en-

joyed the day out, and we each took away something we learnt or found interesting.
