 Recently while walking out of Open Space, I ran into a student who was very excited about making Elephant Toothpaste in Bianka Laubsch's class. Of course, I could not miss an opportunity to see and hear about this! The two things that I took away were how engaged the students were and how they were looking at the impact of different variables such as heating up the yeast, not adding as much water to the yeast and experimenting with colours too. They were also willing to answer any of the questions that were asked of them and reflected on the tier 3 (technical) language that Bianka referred to – they knew these words!

Current Concerns Raised re Bullying and Harassment

An update on the information that I shared with families on 6 June:

- Review of our Bullying Prevention Policy and developing an Action Plan this work has begun with staff and Governing Council. We will begin with the SRC before the end of the term. At the Governing Council meeting, we discussed ways of going forward to ensure there is consultation with the wider school community. I will update you about this process before the end of next week
- Last week, we held assemblies to share the policy with students. Students also had one lesson with their Home Group to further unpack the policy. - The building of a block of toilets as part of the Year 7 build, is progressing and on track to be finished by the beginning of term 3. We are also investigating if we can convert any student toilets in the school into individual cubicles.

Mobile Phone and Mobile Devices Update

It was great to get feedback from the SRC that overwhelmingly the policy is working and that in the Year 12 Open Space area there is lots of talking and even playing UNO!

I have processed some exemptions for students. We have decided on 2 main categories for exemptions:

- Medical this includes diabetes, anxiety and anaphylaxis these students get a card that says Medical – at all times. These students cannot use their phone at all times for general phone calls and texts etc – they are aware of this
- Conditional eg a student has to go to a certain place to make a phone call. These students have been given a card to keep in their phone

There have been a few students who do not have a credit/visa card or have forgotten they can't use their phone to go to the canteen – we have worked with these students to allow them to purchase food and to work out a solution going forward.

Progress against Site Improvement Plan

Staff are currently consolidating their work in the area of differentiation. As part of their Performance Development Plan meetings that are currently occurring, each teacher is asked to share evidence of their impact of differentiation through 'small data'. We are keen to see what small data is provided. Anecdotal information is that there is a range of data – the conversations associated with this are the important part of this improvement work.



Key Points from Governing Council

- Bullying Prevention Policy Ashton Hurn attended the Governing Council Meeting on Monday 19 June along with 12 additional parents and Anne Barclay. At the beginning of the meeting, I shared progress against the 3 points that were shared with parents in the recent letter. These parents then also contributed to the beginning of the development of the Action Plan aligned with the Bullying Prevention Policy
- Traffic on roads adjacent to school a traffic study is being undertaken. This is shared work with Barossa Council, Department for Infrastructure and Transport and Department for Education
- New 7 block of toilets this work has commenced and the new toilets should be available term 3. This was part of the Year 7 build
- Mental Health Support Worker Our school is included in the current round of recruitment for a School Mental Health Practitioner. The schools involved in this round of recruitment are:
 - Barossa Yorke Mid North
 - Kadina Memorial School
 - Nuriootpa High School
 - Moonta Area School
 - Kapunda High School

The School Mental Health Practitioner will hopefully commence onsite in Term 3. Interviews are In late June.

- Finance the school budget was approved
 - Report from Building and Grounds Committee included:
 - Reordering a tree for the courtyard (replacing one which died)
 - Umbrellas quote for replacing these
 - Shade shelters on northern oval investigating costs & Greenock Creek Cricket club are also looking for a grant
 - Bins DfE are implementing new waste program across schools. An audit has been completed on external and internal bins. Roll out of these bins will occur during July/September
 - New grounds shed works have commenced
 - New water fountains are to be installed
 - Memorial Hall work is being undertaken to use the stage for storage for outdoor education
 - IEC playground
 - Softfall has been completed
 - ~ We are waiting on quotes for shade
 - Two 4 square courts are to be painted in front of the new multi-purpose building at the request of some Year 7 students
 - Work from the recent tree audit has been completed

School Card

School Card covers **\$355** of the Materials & Services Charge. The additional \$43 of Materials & Services fee will be waived if School Card is approved. Families must apply for School Card annually and lodge an application at the school where the student attends.

If you are unsure of your eligibility and require further assistance please contact the Finance Office. If you are found to be ineligible for School Card then you are liable to pay the Materials & Services Charge of \$498 less the Government Rebate of \$100.

Tuesday Tasties & the IEC1 Store

In Semester 1 we had 2 Cross-Disciplinary Studies classes in the IEC. Us-

ing an inquiry approach, students had the opportunity to brainstorm and make decisions about their own learning in this subject.

We developed projects that aligned with student interests and learning needs, connected to multiple areas of the curriculum and provided opportunities to contribute something meaningful for their school or local community. Both programs ended up involving a fundraising element.

Tuesday Tasties (TT)

The Cross Disc. Class in IEC3 opted to run a catering program for IEC/SC staff and students, with any profits to go towards shade and a basketball hoop for our IEC playground. During Term 1 we spent time planning and preparing. We:

- conducted market research to determine what meals would be most popular
- researched and occasionally trialled recipes
- completed a Hygienic Food Handling Certificate
- worked out the cost of groceries for each meal
- agreed on set prices for meals
- made decisions about serving sizes and packaging
- calculated potential profits
- made order tickets
- planned advertising

All of the pre-planning was what made our program possible, because as it turns out, a catering business requires a lot of thinking and forward planning!

The meals we had on offer were pizza & juice, nachos & fruit salad, hamburgers & milkshakes, and sausage rolls & hot chocolates. We followed a job roster – jobs included food/drink prep, cleaning, customer service (managing orders, phone calls, service & delivery), and photography. We also usually found time to review our income and expenses for each event and work out our profits, sought out and reflected on feedback.

When asked what they thought about the program, our Tuesday Tasties students told us:

- We learned about selling products
- It was good learning to cook some new recipes
- We enjoyed cooking

WOODWIND ENSEMBLE PERFORMANCE




