#### 2024 Staffing Update

- Jenelle Draper has accepted a one-year contract as the Inclusive Educator in the Felixstow Office for 2024. The
  schools she is working with are very fortunate to have someone with her skills and expertise. We wish her
  well.
- Sue Clark will continue in the role of Inclusive Education Assistant Principal for 2024. Natalie Noack will continue in the role of English Leader for 2024 backfilling Sue. It is great to have continuity of staff.
- We are currently in the panel processes for Technologies Leader and HASS/Languages Leader for 2024 onwards.

#### **Final Term for 4 Staff Members**

For 4 of our staff, it is their final term at Nuriootpa High School and in the department - Sandy Maddock, Stephen Radke, Sue Matthews and Kim Darmody. Four very valued staff with many years' experiences between them. We hope that each one of them enjoys their last term at our school.

#### **Timetable for 2024**

Schools are given funds for staffing via a Student-Centred Funding Model. These funds determine how many staff (teachers and school support officers) that the school can employ – schools determine how these funds are used. Once students have made their subject choices, we collate this work and initially determine which classes will not run due to very low numbers. This work is done collaboratively as a leadership team. Grids are then developed to look at the best fit for the most students with their choices. At this stage we then look at classes that are not viable due to student numbers. This process continues to ensure we maximise the student choices.

#### **Facilities Updates**

- **Upgrade of Student Toilets** the department is funding the redesign of 2 toilet blocks to provide individual cubicles (doors to the external side of the building and removal of common waiting area) and in a 3<sup>rd</sup> set of toilets making the cubicles from floor to ceiling. We have a meeting on November 23<sup>rd</sup> to commence this work. It will take 12 months.
- **Tanks** between the Quad buildings and the Disability Unit have been moved during the holidays. This has made such a difference to this area. The tanks have been relocated to the Eastern Oval end of the Quad buildings they will be fenced off.

#### **Successes**

#### Year 12 Final Assembly

The Year 12 assembly was run by the SRC for the Year 12 students. As we do not have space for all students to be in the stadium, the Year 7s had the assembly live streamed to them. The speech to the students from Amelia O'Rielly and Hartley Eggleton was very moving – they shared their journey through our school and finished with some wonderful words.

#### Year 12 Graduation evening

This event was extremely well attended with over 1000 people there. It is wonderful to have an opportunity to celebrate and formally farewell the Year 12 students with their family and friends. A huge thanks to everyone who was involved in the organisation of the evening.

#### • FLC Community Grant with Barossa Foundation

Congratulations to Bruce Hall who applied for a Community Grant where there is a \$1,500 limit. Bruce initially made an application for \$5,000 not knowing this and then re-wrote it for \$500 for a smaller project with a bench. His initial application created a lot of conversation as the Board felt very strongly about a basketball project and they agreed to fund the full \$5,000 for the basketball court project rather than the bench project! The Barossa Foundation whole community grants is usually \$5,000 in total, so this is unprecedented.

A huge thanks to the Barossa Foundation – their work and contributions to our school are outstanding – so many of our students benefit from their generosity.

#### Music Performance of 'One Night Samba'

This was an extremely enjoyable evening. We have such talented music students and a very talented music staff. Thanks to the staff for their dedication and congratulations on showcasing our students.

#### WHS Audit

We recently had a positive WHS audit. It reflects the great work of the WHS team – they were across all the audited items with only a few tweaks needed. Thanks to this team.

#### **Year 7 Transition**

The Inclusive Education Centre students have begun their transition visits to our school, with several of them accompanied by their SSOs from their home school. It has also been good to meet some of the parents of these students. Thanks to Erin Dayman for leading this transition process.

Thanks to Andrew Turnbull for leading the mainstream transition work – he has commenced meeting with schools about the students coming to us next year. Year 6 students have also commenced their transition visit. It has been great to have our current students leading parts of these visits.

#### **Site Improvement Plan (SIP) Progress**

Faculties have continued to consolidate the work that we have been undertaking for the improvement journey which is being documented to develop our Whole School Pedagogical approach, ensuring we have a consistent approach across the school.

On the first day back this term, Olivia Jones, Wellbeing Leader shared with staff the Wellbeing and Engagement Collection data to provide information about the possible inclusion of a Wellbeing Goal in our 2024 SIP.

#### **Governing Council**

- New SRC Proxy Chair and Deputy Chair attended the meeting great to see the next group of students stepping up
- **Bullying Prevention Action Plan** update from Con Karvouniaris and the Working Party actions have been developed for each strategy based on feedback from students, parents and staff. Governing Council agreed to further develop this plan. The Action Plan will then be shared with the school community. A Parents In Education Grant has been applied for to fund an external provider to provide sessions for students, families and staff. Governing Council have also applied for a Pastoral Care Worker to continue to provide a very valuable service to our school and be an integral member of our Wellbeing Team.
- Traffic on roads adjacent to school we are awaiting DITs input into the final draft.
- **IEC Playground** agreed to proceed with shelter for each piece of equipment rather than put shelter over the whole play area
- Materials and Services fees agreed to poll for \$510 online poll will go live on 10 November and closes 24 November
- Draft Budget to be presented at next meeting.

For 2024, the Governing Council is recommending the M&S charge for 2024 be \$510.00

This is a slight increase on the M&S charge for 2023 due to the increase in the cost of materials and supplies.

As the Materials and Services Charge is greater than the legislated prescribed amount(s), as referenced in the Education and Children's Services Act, the Governing Council is required to undertake a poll to gain majority support from the school community for this proposed charge to be compulsory, and therefore recoverable in full.

The Governing Council therefore seeks your support for the proposed 2024 Materials and Services Charge of \$510.00 plus subject charges (if applicable) to be approved.

If the majority of parents support the Governing Council proposed Materials and Services Charge (plus subject charges) then all parents, caregivers and independent students (excluding approved School Card holders) are liable for this charge.

Each family is entitled to one vote per student per poll, with a majority based on the number of respondents. The poll will open on 10 November and will close on 24 November, 2023.

The Government will be providing a \$100 rebate in 2024 for all parents, carers and independent students required to pay the 2024 Materials and Services Charge. The rebate does not apply to parents, carers and independent students who have been approved for School Card. Schools will be required to issue the rebate for each eligible student as soon as the 2024 Materials and Services Charge is invoiced.


## From the IEC Art Class

NHS IEC Art Masters Work Included in the 'Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art in the Classroom Vol. 2' Book.

Work from the NHS Inclusive Education class, The Art Masters has been included in the recent publication of the 'Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art in the Classroom Vol. 2' Book.

In 2021 The Art Masters investigated and responded to the drawings of Betty Muffler, creating their own 'Sense of Place' artworks. With teacher, Arlon Hall, they utilised AGSA Education resources to gain an understanding of Muffler's work. Students then explored drawing with ink while using Chinese ink brushes. Inspired by Muffler's connection to place, students created individual drawings based on a connection to place or something that had been handed down to them from their family or a combination of both. Students then translated these drawings into A2 drawings and also engaged in a collaborative large-scale ink drawing where they chose elements of their own drawings and incorporated them into a large composition. These artworks, alongside supporting artists statements, were selected to be included in the student example section in the book. You can find their work on page 148 & 149.

This publication suggests effective and meaningful ways to integrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures into the daily life of any teaching and learning environment. The book guides teachers through ways to encourage students to genuinely respond to First Nations artists' works, instead of merely copying a style or technique used by artists. Central to this process is the easy -to-follow flowchart 'A guide to using works of art as a starting point', presented alongside new and varied examples of best teaching practice.

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## Year 9 Drawing & Painting—Madhubani Inspired Drawings





## School Bus Bushfire Procedures

On days of forecast catastrophic fire danger rating for the Murraylands, Mid North & Mt Lofty Nuriootpa High School will remain open.

Parents/caregivers of students who travel on school buses will be contacted via an SMS message to their mobile phone or a direct call to their landline (where a mobile has not been given to the school). This will generally occur the night before.

#### If a bushfire is reported in the area during the day

If a bushfire is reported in the area during the day: Affected bus runs will not leave the school until the roads are declared safe by emergency services authorities.

Parents/caregivers will be notified and students will be supervised at school until buses can run, or until parents/ caregivers are able to collect their children.

If during a bus run, the bus driver sights a bushfire and there is concern that it may affect the routes ahead, then the bus driver: Has the authority to abandon the bus run and return to school, or If safer to do so, drive to one of the pre-planned emergency areas (or CFS safer places) and activate the emergency bus procedure.

To support student safety, parents/caregivers are requested to:

- Ensure that Nuriootpa High School is informed of any changes to phone numbers
- Follow weather announcements through the media
- Ensure that parent/caregivers do not put themselves at risk when coming to collect students from school
