





Learning for life

Nuriootpa High School offers a broad and varied range of curriculum. Our junior and middle school students (years seven to ten) study across eight learning areas centered around the Australian Curriculum:

- Arts (music, drama and visual arts)
- English
- Mathematics
- Health and Physical Education (including Home Economics)
- Humanities and social sciences (including History and Geography)
- Languages (German and/or Indonesian)
- Science (including Agriculture)
- Technologies

These learning areas prepare students for senior school (years 11 and 12) learning which is based on the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE). Course counselling (subject selection) generally occurs during term three, in preparation for the following year.

Alternative pathways

As we recognise success is individual, we also offer alternative learning pathways including Vocational Education and Training (VET), school-based apprenticeships or traineeships and Tailored Learning (previously Flexible Learning Options).

Inclusive Education

We provide specialised learning for students with high support needs through our Inclusive Education Centre, and offer multiple Special classes. Our school also supports gifted and talented students across the curriculum.

First Nations learners

Nuriootpa High School is proud to offer dedicated and culturally safe support to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, guided by an Aboriginal Education Teacher and Aboriginal Secondary Transition Officer, with tailored tutoring offered in our Nunga Room.

Nuriootpa High School is committed to providing quality secondary education through diversity of curriculum choice and pathway options. Our teaching staff are subject area experts, with deep knowledge to facilitate engaging student learning experiences, fostering learner aspiration and talent.

Our curriculum is curated with learner diversity in mind, which is reflected through the range of subjects on offer, the design of learning and assessment tasks and tailored learning support, underpinned by the philosophy that success can look different for different learners.

Students are guided through their individual learner journey with pathway options that provide opportunities, knowledge and skills to prepare for success beyond school.

Focus on positive education and learner wellbeing

Nuriootpa High School follows a Positive Behaviours for Learning (PBL) framework based on positive psychology, follows Trauma informed-practice and uses a restorative practice philosophy.

Underpinning these approaches is our Universal Behaviour Expectations which promote respectful interaction and behaviours that are conducive to learning. The three key areas of these expectations are:

- Respect for learning
- Respect for yourself and others
- Respect for the environment





Student wellbeing is a priority at Nuriootpa High School, with a dedicated wellbeing team including an on-site mental health practitioner, youth worker, case worker and specific Aboriginal student support. Our wellbeing leadership operate programs to support specific social-emotional needs within our school community, and provide confidential counselling support. Additionally, our Doctors On Campus (DOCs) program enables early intervention mental health care via GP and/or psychologist support on-site.

Wellbeing initiatives such bullying prevention programs, explicit emotional regulation teaching (Berry Street Education Model), Positive Behaviours for Learning (PBL) and restorative practices underpin our school policies and are embedded across the curriculum.

Our school house system also plays a role in supporting student wellbeing as it aims to promote student participation in school life including academic, sporting and community endeavours with a focus on fostering inclusion and rewarding positive behaviour. Students are assigned to one of five school houses: Angas, Coutlhard, Light, Murray or Sturt.

Nuriootpa High School is part of the Department for Education's National Student Wellbeing Program which provides non-religious pastoral care to support student wellbeing complementary to our school's existing wellbeing initiatives. Additionally, a twice weekly breakfast club provides students with free breakfast.

Transitioning to secondary school

Transitioning from primary school to secondary school is an exciting time. However, we recognise that it can also feel overwhelming.

To support a successful transition to secondary school, a transition program is offered to commencing year seven students during term four of the year prior to their commencement. Students will be invited to attend transition days on-site which will enable them to become familiar with our school grounds and gain an insight into our curriculum, along with opportunities to build relationships with teachers and peers.

Upon commencement in year seven students will be supported through orientation activities in the first weeks, and will be placed into a home group class to facilitate pastoral care and continuity of peer relationships. Simultaneously, a structured mentor/buddy system is facilitated between year seven and year 11 students to foster belonging and connection.

Transport

Students residing within the Nuriootpa High School district who live more than five kilometres from the school are eligible to use Department for Education operated busses at no cost. Fifteen bus routes currently operate to/from our school - further route information is available on our school website.

BYOD

The Australian Curriculum requires students to access and utilise ICT across their subjects. Nuriootpa High School is a 'Bring Your Own Device' (BYOD) school, and highly recommends that each students have their own laptop for use at school and home. A list of recommended devices is available on our website, with access to a dedicate purchasing portal through Learning With Technologies. Upon commencement new students will be supported by our on-site IT team to get set up on the school network, which enables access to a range of software, at no additional cost, to support their learning.

Uniform

All students at Nuriootpa High School are expected to wear our school uniform which has been developed in consultation with our student body and Governing Council. Items can be purchased through our on-site uniform shop which is open every Thursday during school terms, and selected hours prior to the commencement of the school year.

Enrolment
