COVID19 Update

Readiness if there is another outbreak

- Staff are to continue to plan 2 weeks of learning in advance

Physical distancing

All adults must continue to follow the density and physical distancing requirements outlined by SA Health. These are:

- No more than 1 person per 2-square metres in an enclosed space
- Maintain a minimum social distance of 1.5 metres

School sports

From Monday 1 June restrictions for school related sport were eased as follows:

- Non-contact sport competition can commence from 1 June 2020 (indoor and outdoor)
- Contact sport training activities can commence from 1 June 2020 (indoor and outdoor)
- Contact competition activities can commence from 25 June 2020 (indoor and outdoor)

We are to continue to keep gatherings of adults to an absolute minimum. Spectators aren't permitted except for 1 parent/carer per student. All adults must practice appropriate physical distancing. Once competitions start, fixtures must reduce the number of teams in contact with each other. For example competitions within the same school or club between similar level of players. Our students have been very successful in many school sports events over the last few weeks. Thanks to the students for representing our school and to the staff for coaching the students.

COVID19 Update - continued

Some current impact of the COVID19 pandemic includes:

- The Curriculum Expo for 2020 has been cancelled note there are a range of other ways that students and parents can gain information
- Counselling for 2021 subjects will continue to happen face-to-face unless there is a change in the COVID19 status. We are planning on 'spreading out' the counselling teams across the Resource Centre for compliance
- The Wine Launch for 2020 has been cancelled. Our concern is that the students of the Year 12 Hospitality class, who were to cater for this event, may have had to change their major assessment task at the last minute. We were also concerned about how many people could be catered for within the winery

Teaching Staff Update

- Panels that have been completed for 2021 2026
 - ~ Assistant Principal: Inclusive Education Jenelle Draper
 - ~ Design and Technology Faculty Leader John Barkley

It is great to have both of these staff members extending their time at our school.

- The following positions are currently in appeal process:
 - ~ FLC Senior Leader
 - ~ Health and Personal Development Faculty Leader
- The following positions are currently in panel status:
 - ~ Female Wellbeing Leader
 - ~ Humanities and Social Sciences and Languages Faculty Leader
 - ~ Disability Unit and Special Class Faculty Leader
- Our school received \$81K for 'Complexity Funding' as part of the new Enterprise Agreement. Staff have agreed to use this for external case management for some students at the FLC and to increase the curriculum SSO support for mainstream students. Students in the Disability Unit and Special Class also have an increase of 15 hours per week.
- Staffing for 2021
 - ~ We are currently discussing the configuration of the Year Level Team for Years 9 and 10. Currently this is a Year Level Coordinator across years 9 and 10 and a Year Level Manager at each of years 9 and 10.
 - ~ Congratulations to Jenny Howard, Georgiana Quintal and Anne Johnson who are returning as permanent teachers in 2021.
 - ~ Our Personnel Advisory Committee is also currently looking at the configuration of our SSO hours in the non-curriculum area and determining if they need to be changed for 2021.
- Staffing for 2022
 - ~ We are declaring 2 positions for permanent primary teachers over the next 2 weeks. These staff will be appointed to our school in preparation for 2022 when the year 7 students arrive. They will join our school community for some shared professional learning during 2021 but remain at their primary schools for 2021.

Well Done Awards for Students

I have begun presenting 'Well Done Awards' to students after nomination by their teachers, SSOs and canteen manager. These have been for academic achievements, attitude to work, compassion and creating safe and welcoming classrooms, support in the canteen and 100% participation in activities. Personally I have been really impressed by the response of each student's peers when I go to the classrooms and present these awards. Wonderful to see such recognition.

Well done FLC team

Behind the scenes there is some data that is collected and shared with our regional and state FLO teams and managers a number of times throughout a school year. The data that is captured is part of a review of students who have NOT engaged in learning of any sort throughout the year. Our FLC data at this stage of the year shows that only one out of the 75 FLO students we have had enrolled with us this year hasn't engaged in any type of accredited learning. This is an amazing outcome as acknowledged by the Regional FLO leader. Congratulations to the FLC team.

Year 7 to High School Planning Update

The Executive Team are currently working through a centrally developed Implementation Tool to thoroughly plan for all of the work that needs to be undertaken to accommodate our Year 7 students in 2022. We have commenced much of this work, including work that is being led by faculty leaders, as we work towards formalising the process.



Year 7 Facilities Update

- We have agreed on the 3 buildings that are part of this project:
 - ~ A new Technical Studies room that will cater for middle school students
 - ~ Increasing the size of the Hospitality Centre to cater up to 22 students
 - ~ A multi-purpose building with 2 Art rooms, a Performing Arts Space, a Music Room, a weights/fitness room, a classroom and a small teacher preparation space
 - ~Documentation for the tender process by the architects has been completed.
 - ~ Our Business Manager is working with the faculty leaders to get quotes for the Furniture, Fittings and Equipment (FFE) needed within these classrooms
 - \sim The tender should be out during the latter part of August. DPTI have targeted 3 preferred providers for the build
 - ~ The building process will happen simultaneously across the 3 different buildings in order to be finished on time. This means that we will have 3 builders' yards across the school. Languages, 2 tennis courts near the Tech Studies area with entrance in front of Auto and in the garden area opposite the Hospitality Centre. Negotiations are happening to look at a temporary staff car parking

The current start date for the build is 7 December with a predicted finish date in late October, 2021.

New Special Class in 2022

During the school holidays I had a meeting with a range of personnel from head office and our local education office. They asked if we would consider having a second Special Class in 2021 and then a third in 2022 as scheduled. The 'sweetener' is that we may then have the possibility of getting a new Double Disability Unit block of 2 class-rooms opposite the current Disability classrooms with a play area in between. We have agreed that we would like this option and are awaiting a decision from central office.

Year 7 Curriculum

Leaders and staff have been discussing possible models for curriculum for Years 7 and 8. We have agreed on a model which balances all curriculum areas across Years 7 and 8. The model now includes Digital Technology as a discrete subject. It comprises;

- a full year of English, Maths, Science/Ag and HASS
- a Semester of Design Technology, Languages, Health and Personal Development, Home Economics
- a term each of Music, Visual Arts, Drama and Digital Technology

Facilities

- Home Ec kitchens we are getting a quote to see if we can upgrade these areas before the Year 7 students arrive
- Windows in Admin Building the department gave us a grant to replace these. Work commenced on 4 August
- A 10km/h speed sign has been installed at the entrance to the Penrice Road Staff Carpark in response to an identified hazard

Pupil Free Day

This was a very positive day with 2 sessions in faculties focussing on the site improvement journey. Different faculties are at different places with this work. All faculties were expected to document their agreed expectations re technical vocabulary. During the other session staff elected to do an ICT session of their choice. This was very successful with staff extending their learning in areas such as OneNote, Office 365, Flipped Learning, DayMap, Dragon Software (voice to text), Digital Inking and online SACE sessions.

Governing Council Update

The council is currently looking at increasing the number of parent representatives on this group. During the discussions about increasing the parent representatives, we have also talked about including up to 3 Community Representatives. We will be holding an extraordinary meeting prior to our next Governing Council meeting on Tuesday September 8th to discuss and formalise this process. There is then a lengthy process with documentation to get this approved.

Other information discussed at the meeting included:

- Recommendation about the current status of the Languages Review:
 - ~ German continues as one of the languages
 - ~ AUSLAN is taught after school one night per week in 2021– offered to students and community members monitor how this is going during term 1, 2021
 - ~ Language teachers, leader and principal to meet with a panel of experts to further explore what the second language for the school should be
 - ~ Further explore the second language offering and make recommendation by the end of term 1, 2021



Governing Council Update - continued

- A new cool room to be installed in the canteen in the October holidays
- A generous donation by Yalumba of vines to be replanted due to drought and frost
- Dan Falkenberg is now being a mentor/adviser to our wine staff team
- Richard Mattner and a colleague have been blending samples of our fortified wines. They will use their volunteer day that they have per month to come and look at volumes of each of our fortifieds and then begin a process where we will have a port each year and top us for the next year. Amazing to see such support
- The school's Resource Plan outlining how we have committed current funds for 2020 and beyond was passed

FROM THE SRC

The SRC, along with Chris Hall from the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board, ATSI students and Unit students, have initiated our revegetation project through our planting on Wednesday the 12 August. To prepare for this we had been out in the Blue Gums removing rice millet weeds to create a clear space to grow native understory. Our grounds staff have supported the program in clearing areas and creating a fire-break across the woodlands.

We have also been working closely with Ms Burgess to appropriately advertise this event with plans to post further fundraising opportunities and any other developments surrounding our revegetation project to keep the community in the loop!

Additionally we have been exploring options for formal signage along Murray Street which will advertise the Blue Gums to the wider community. Our secretaries, Katie and Amber, have been assisting putting together designs whilst organising quotes.

As well as this, the SRC have been discussing more sustainable options for gold coin donation collection on casual days, and Ms Dayman has kindly reached out to offer her support. Her textiles class will begin making small fabric bags for each homegroup in the

next couple of weeks. We are currently looking donations of fabric and cotton thread. There are collection boxes located in the library and open space. We will continue to accept donations throughout Term 3.



Ag Lessons

During Miss Roger's Agriculture lessons the Special Class have been working with the sheep and goats. Although the Adelaide Show will not be held traditionally this year, the sheep will still be presented at the Merino Wether Show so we have been helping to acclimatise the sheep to student interaction.

'STEM'

This is our first term running a unit of 'Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths' (STEM) in the Special Class.

We have begun with Isaac Newton's Three Laws of Motion:

1. The universe is lazy

Things keep doing what they were doing unless acted on by an unbalanced force. We illustrated this in our books with a drawing of a couch.

2. The amount something moves is influenced by its weight and the strength of the force acting on it

We illustrated this with two swings, one with a large person on it and one with a small person on it.

3. For every action there is an equal and opposite reaction

We illustrated this in our books with a cannon and cannon ball. The cannon being pushed in one direction and the cannon ball

in the other.

It is this third law that we demonstrated as a class by building and firing water rockets. This was fun for all with lots of creativity and healthy self-expression in evidence.

Working with Trent

This term our Unit PLP class has been undertaking Work Experience on site. This has become necessary because of COVID restrictions ruling out students doing work experience in the community. We are very fortunate to have Trent Heneker (our Youth Worker and Groundsman) as our facilitator. He is skilled at engaging the students and in pitching the work to students' levels of ability, while giving them a chance to stretch themselves.

So far we have planted out a garden bed in the school quadrangle near the canteen. Trent discussed the variety and placement of each plant and we dug the holes and planted the bed. Students have learned to safely use the bin lifter which is used to empty wheelie bins into the school skips.

In class we are learning about Work Place Hazards and Personal Protective Equipment. Students are producing their own safety poster.

Our next stage is for students to safely learn how to use power equipment.
