#### Staffing Update 2021

Congratulations to:

- Erin Dayman who has won the Disability Unit/Special Class Coordinator role
- Daniel Gibbs who is currently teaching at Port Augusta Secondary School, will join us as a Senior School Maths (1.0FTE) teacher
- Narelle Hancock who has won the Chemistry and Science (0.6FTE) permanent position
- Vanessa Higgs who has won the Psychology and Science (0.6 FTE) permanent position
- Michael Slade and Brooke Krizman who have won SSO positions in the 2 Special Classes

#### Staffing Update 2022

David Vaughan and I have begun the panel process for the permanent primary teachers to be appointed to NHS in 2022. We will be interviewing potential employees this week.

#### Year 7 to High School Update

The Executive Team are working on an implementation tool to undertake this work, in collaboration with the Leadership Team. The topics we are addressing via this implementation tool are:

- Curriculum Planning and Student Learning within our Site Improvement Plan for 2021 we are proposing that we include work on the Year 7 curriculum through the writing and numeracy lens
- Staff Planning as noted above, we are currently in a panel process for 2 teachers from the primary schools. We have also begun looking at non-curriculum SSO hours and how they are deployed. What areas will be most impacted by another 200 plus students?
- Facilities Planning we are currently in the tender process for the new buildings (multi-purpose, technical studies and hospitality). Work should commence on December 14<sup>th</sup>. We are currently finalising the plan for the Disability Unit double building. We have asked the department to look at Buildings 15 and 34 to see if they can be upgraded or replaced.
- Budget Planning we are continuing to progress the development of the 2021 budget to have approval by the end of this year. Final approval for the budget happens next year when final student numbers are known and the department provides us with the Resource Entitlement Statement (usually in April).
- School Community some work on Continuity of Learning has begun with our ATSI students through a Barossa Partnership approach. All current Year 5, 6 and 7 Aboriginal students have had one meeting with staff from Nuriootpa High School.
- Professional Learning Curriculum leaders are already planning for what needs to be done in this area. At last week's staff meeting, they began/continued some work on the Year 7 curriculum.
- Required Transition we are already thinking about how we double the current transition process that we have for our Year 7s. Potentially we will have at least 450 new students on day one, 2022!!
- Required Orientation
- Required Engagement

#### **New Facilities Update**

The preferred tenderers have visited our school and we are awaiting the outcome of this tender process. The current start date for the build is 14 December 2020 with a predicted finish date in late October, 2021. We are finalising the Furniture, Fittings and Equipment (FFE) requests for these new buildings. There are still some issues to be addressed due to gas capacity etc. We have negotiated a potential parking space for staff during the new build as part of the main carpark will become a builder's yard.

Staff who currently work in the building to be demolished (Drama) have begun packing and moving so that this building is available to the successful tenderers from 14 December.

#### Disability Unit New Facility and New Special Class in 2022

We are working with an architect from central office to adapt a floor plan for the double classroom new building that will be located opposite the existing building. This building will be placed in this section of the school in the latter part of next year.

To accommodate the additional special class in 2021, there will be a wall added to some existing rooms to create this extra space. This will be done prior to school commencing next year.

#### FROM THE PRINCIPAL - continued

#### Start of 2022

Next year students return to school on Wednesday 27 January. Our staff have voted for teachers to return to school on Wednesday 21 January as a Pupil Free Day and then work their normal Thursday and Friday. This means they will have Monday 25 January 2021 as a long weekend.

#### Day One, 2021

Students will have a full day in their year levels and commence lessons on the Thursday.

#### **Governing Council**

Some key points from the Governing Council Meeting on Tuesday 27 October were:

- Traffic adjacent to school The Governing Council has established a Working Party to take this issue up with the local council again. There is increased concern with the additional Year 7s coming to our school in 2022 and the volume of student traffic across the roads at peak times.
- Mobile Phone Policy the Governing Council discussed the proposed policy and agreed to take this forward. This has since been discussed by the Leadership Team.
- Constitution Change the council wanted to increase its' membership to accommodate the increased number of parents and also include community volunteers. This has now been approved so that the council can now comprise:
  - ~ 1 Principal (ex-officio)
  - ~ 15 elected parents of the school
  - ~ 3 staff of the school (nominated by the staff of the school)
  - ~ 2 Student Representative Council members
  - ~ 3 Community members appointed by the school.

The new constitution allows for additional parents and 3 community members.

- Change of Registration for the school the school is now registered to have Year 7 12 students enrolled.
- Gender based awards there was a conversation about whether awards should be gender based. This conversation will continue to be on the agenda as further information was requested by the members.
- Materials and Services poll at the council meeting it was reported that the poll was active. We were the first school in the state to undertake this poll. Since the Governing Council meeting, the 2 Council members who were nominated to get the result have informed us that there was a positive vote. This means that the Materials and Services charge will be \$480 for 2021. This has a positive impact on our budget.

#### **SRC REPORT**

The end of 2020 is near, and what a year it has been! This year we have fulfilled some of our long term goals, including a revegetation day and having sustainable, material bags for casual day.

Earlier this year Ms Dayman, with the Disability Unit, brought our dreams to reality, with the offer

of creating material bags for money collection on casual days. Four students from Ms Dayman's Business and Enterprise class created 60 reusable bags, enough for our current homegroups and room to expand when the year 7s join high school! The DU students suggested that they were on the same page with using sustainable materials to complete as much of the project as possible, and all bags were created from sustainably sourced, recycled material.

We would like to thank everyone who donated material or thread, it was a great help to completing this task. As a class they designed the bags, developed a pattern, cut, overlocked and sewed more than 120 sections, and threaded nearly 80 metres of ribbon.

This opportunity was a really fun activity, that created a wonderful reusable product that will help support our school to be more sustainable, but was also a valuable lesson in breaking down gender stereotypes associated with sewing.

Thank you to Ms Dayman and Ms Griggs who led Hamish Gabel, Brandan Chernih, Jack Fitzgerald and Elsen Trowell to create such a wonderful, sustainable product that will

be used in our school for a long time. We would like to give a special shout out to Jack and Elsen for going above and beyond with their efforts on the machines. We look forward to sharing these bags with all staff and students in Week 4, with our next casual day!



#### SCHOOL SPORT 2020 - A YEAR IN REVIEW

2020 has been an unprecedented year to say the least and school sport was no exception.

The year began as per usual, our Year 8 Splash Day and Swimming Carnival at the Nuriootpa War Memorial Swimming Pool was a great success with lots of participation and fun. To start the Knockout Sport year we had our Open Boys Cricket play Balaklava in Malala and were marginally defeated. Our 8/9 Boys Cricket achieved much greater success in the Country North division, so much so they progressed through to the Final against Maitland and were crowned champions, Well Done Boys!

For the first time we entered an Open Girls T20 Girls team and had great participation and interest. The girls played Clare and despite enjoying the day and learning some valuable skills and knowledge, went down marginally. Our Open Tennis teams were drawn against Faith and Clare in Term 1, however did not progress to Round 2.

Friday of Week 6 was our Annual Sports Day and with the introduction of Houses 2 years ago has initiated a whole new element of competition and colour to the day. Light have reigned champions for 2 consecutive years now with some outstanding athletes amongst them and high participation rates. As a result of COVID, unfortunately we were unable to compete in the Secondary Schools Interschool Athletics Championship at Mile End. For the first time in over a decade Nuriootpa High School were promoted to Division A this year and we look forward to this re-commencing again in 2021.

Term 3 started with a bang, many sports draws coming out with only weeks to prepare as a result of sport being on hold during Term 2 as a result of COVID regulations. First up was Australian Football competitions. The Open Boys were matched up against Faith in Round 1 and were marginally defeated by the arch rival yet again. The Open Girls were slightly more successful, advancing through to the second round, however knocked out by a strong Gleeson College team. The 8/9 Girls lost to Birdwood in Round 1 despite having a blast as usual . Our 8/9 Boys were a very strong outfit



this year and advanced through against Clare, Victor Harbour, Playford and Golden Grove to meet Tenison Woods (Mt Gambier) in the final at Thebarton Oval. The boys played in great spirit however were overcome by an elite squad from 'down south'.

As per usual our netballers began Round 1 with an extremely challenging Round Robin Tournament including Faith, Trinity, Renmark and Kadina. Both the 8/9 and Open Teams were strong this year and fought hard with many wins, however not enough to advance through to Round 2.

Both our Open Boys and Girls Hockey Teams advanced through to the State Hockey Championships this year and were up against Grant, Henley and Prince Alfred College. Despite some success, PAC were too strong on the day and won the championships.

As a result of a shortened year in sport, only Open Soccer took place this year, the 8/9's will definitely be back on in 2021. Our Open Boys were defeated by Glossop in Round 1, however our girls had an outstanding year making it through to the final after overcoming Glossop, Mark Oliphant and Edward John Eyre in the minor Rounds. The girls came up against Cabra in the final and unfortunately were marginally defeated.

In Basketball our Open Boys were defeated by a very strong Kadina team in Round 1 and the 8/9 Boys were defeated by Faith. Our Girls Teams have had much greater success, progressing through to the final in the Open Girls where they met Unity College and Marryatville High. A fantastic effort by the girls to finish 3<sup>rd</sup> in the state up against some quality opposition throughout the season. The 8/9 Girls are playing this week in their state final against Kadina, Naracoorte, Balaklava and Kildare. We wish them the best of luck for their finals tournament.

On behalf of all our student athletes who participated in School Sport this year I would like thank our coaches for their outstanding contributions. 
