## From the Principal - continued

### COVID

Conditions that we continue to operate within are:

- ◆ All students and staff to wear masks safely (over nose and mouth). We have published the list of exemptions in DayMap Staff Bulletin daily so all staff know who has exemptions. We understand that mask wearing may stop after 14 April
- ◆ Day excursions can only happen to sites where there are no vaccination requirements
- ◆ Staff meetings and professional learning are still happening largely by Teams
- ◆ Interschool sporting competitions have re-commenced – with much success for our school
- ◆ Extra-curricular activities at the school, including choirs, band practice, instrumental lessons attended by a non-school employed music teacher
- ◆ Work experience and work placements
- ◆ Camps and other outdoor activities required by the SACE for the purpose of subjects such as Outdoor Education

Each day we do a daily 'pulse report' of staff for the department. They are also collecting student daily absenteeism.

### Positive Stories

Nuriootpa High School has some outstanding students who represent us at a school and state level. We also have some outstanding students who are recognised for their achievements within our school.

Here are some of these positive stories:

- ◆ A Year 12 student who has been offered a work experience opportunity to go to the Royal Sydney Show with the stud that she does volunteer work with. This provides a great chance to do her 50 – 60 hours of work experience for her Workplace Practices
- ◆ We have the youngest fully qualified firefighter at one of our local CFS stations – she is managing a fulltime pager and doing really well
- ◆ A female cricketer who was to represent our State in NSW, however the competition has been deferred
- ◆ A Year 7 male student representing SA in Squash at the end of term 1
- ◆ I presented my first round of Principal's Awards over the last couple of weeks

They included:

- ⇒ A Year 11 student who has been picking up papers when he is in the yard and also talking with students about how to dispose of masks in a more environmentally friendly manner
- ⇒ A Year 7 student who is a very capable and conscientious student. In both science and maths he has taken a peer support role upon himself when he has seen other students struggling with the content. He has done this without being asked by the teacher or his peers. The two students he supported were really grateful for his support as they both have learning difficulties and have found the shift to high school challenging at times
- ⇒ A student in the Inclusive Education Centre who has been mentoring a new student to the group
- ⇒ A Year 7 student who volunteered to help students set their computers up for NAPLAN, something that she recognised as a task that would support her peers and her teacher - her kindness, thoughtfulness and generosity exemplify the kind of students we want NHS students to be
- ◆ Barossa Foundation gave us some \$50 vouchers for families. The Wellbeing Team allocated these and Vicki Rochow (Pastoral Care Worker) actioned this work. We have had several recipients share with us how important this voucher has been to their family. Personally talking with a couple of these recipients was heart-warming. Thanks Barossa Foundation and Wellbeing Team
- ◆ Our SRC continues to sponsor a child, Bin in Sri Lanka. This has been ongoing for a few years and it is wonderful that our students can raise funds to do this
- ◆ One of our Year 11 Aboriginal students has won a Dame Roma Mitchell Scholarship to support him completing his SACE. In his letter of congratulations was written:

*The Scholarship is named after the late Dame Roma Mitchell AC, QVE, CVO, QC who had a long association with reconciliation and Aboriginal communities. It is important that Aboriginal people experience success in South Australia and education is an important means to economic and social development in our community. Education will enable you to establish a pathway for the future and allow you to make a future contribution to the Aboriginal people of South Australia. When our young people excel in education and in their chosen careers it contributes to the wider communities' appreciation of Aboriginal history, cultures and identity through community participation and leadership. This scholarship is a contribution towards the completion of your SACE.*

### Staffing Update

- ◆ We welcome Gaynor Saegenschnitter as an SSO with our Inclusive Education Centre. Gaynor has previously worked at the Tanunda Disability Unit
- ◆ We also welcome 2 new employees to the Canteen – Jill Perry and Lisa Staggs who started in week 7 for 10 ½ hours per week each
- ◆ We are currently in panel process to appoint 3 more curriculum SSOs

### Staffing 2023

### Facilities Update

The upgraded Home Ec kitchen has become operational. It is great to have such an improved learning space for our students.

The 8 Year 7 rooms (2 x Quads) are continuing to progress – they will not be totally finished until after the school holidays. Work still to be completed includes another ramp, another set of steps, verandah, paving, a fence to stop students moving between the 2 quads and some bituminising.

The Multi-purpose Building, new Tech Studies room, upgraded Hospitality and Inclusive Education double classroom are all being used and in the defects period.

We are trying to find a company to install the playground equipment for the IEC area as the company who provides the equipment is inundated with work!

The long jump tracks and sandpit will be installed on the eastern side of the eastern oval late March - early April. The Little Athletics Club will pay for a third long jump pit and running track to be installed.

### Mobile Phones Reminder

Last year we introduced the Mobile Phones policy which has had a significant positive impact on student engagement and learning in class. We appreciate the support we continue to have from parents to implement the policy.

## TikTok and Student Wellbeing

With the increase in the use of TikTok we have seen the app become an issue in a number of wellbeing and behaviour incidents.

As a parent are you aware of how TikTok impacts your child's health and wellbeing?

### 1. Is TikTok Safe for Kids?

As with any social media platform, there is always suggestive content mixed into the bag. With TikTok being mostly based on music and video, profanity and suggestive clothing/dancing are the most obvious sources of adult content.

The app also encourages some themes that are much more mature than their 16+ rating would suggest. With a quick hashtag search, your child will have access to mature content, as well as suggestive themes and challenges. With the increase and promotion of inappropriate content, TikTok has been banned in several countries, including China (where the app originated), India, Bangladesh, and Pakistan.

### 2. What is the Age Limit for TikTok?

The minimum age for a TikTok user is 13 years old. While this is great news for younger users, it's important to note that TikTok doesn't use any age verification tools when new users sign up. That means, if your child signs up for a new account without your knowledge, they'll have access to explicit and inappropriate content without restriction.

### 3. What are TikTok's Parental Controls?

With a feature called "Family Pairing", parents can link their child's account to their own where they can control direct messages, set screen time limits, and turn on/off restricted content directly from their phone.

Parents will also receive a notification if any of the settings are changed or turned off from their child's phone.

There's also a "Digital Wellbeing" Setting

One of the more admirable functions in the app is the ability to turn on the 'digital wellbeing' setting. Once turned on, this setting will set time limits on app use, which can help your child moderate the time they spend on their phone. You can also find strategies for keeping your child's screen time in check in this Kid Matters blog post.

This setting also allows a parent to put restrictions on their child's account. This will block videos that have been flagged as inappropriate. An important point to remember however is that not all inappropriate material is flagged properly; things slip through the cracks.

### 4. Will TikTok Affect My Child's Mental Health?

While TikTok is great for socializing and can provide a creative outlet for your child, it can also have some harmful effects. Like with any social media platform, posting videos and pictures regularly leaves your child open to negative reactions and harsh comments.

This can have a huge impact on your child's self-esteem, body image, and confidence. In some instances, it can lead to depression, anxiety, and even eating disorders such as anorexia and bulimia. While those are extreme cases, young users and even influencers on the platform have expressed concerns over the negative comments they receive and how it affects their daily lives.

### 5. Does TikTok Collect User Data?

While this is nothing new and all social-media apps participate in this practice, it is worth reminding parents of. This is a quote directly from TikTok's page on privacy-

"We share your data with our third-party service providers we rely on to help provide you with the Platform. These providers include cloud storage providers and other IT service providers. We also share your information with our business partners, advertisers, analytics and search engine providers..."

One thing they don't mention is that even when the app isn't being used, it's collecting info off of your phone clipboard. That means if you or your child copy and paste sensitive information such as passwords or private conversations, TikTok is noting and storing that information.

## Vaping Legalities

There have been a few incidents this year of students bringing vapes to school. As possessing or using vapes is against the law for people under 18 years we will be involving the police in these matters going forward. Under the Tobacco and E-Cigarette Products Act 1997, it is an offence to:

- sell or supply e-cigarette products to a person under the age of 18 years;
- sell e-cigarette products by retail without a Retail Tobacco and E-Cigarette Merchant's Licence;
- provide or offer to provide free samples, prizes, gifts or other benefits (including through sponsorship, competitions and rewards) in connection to the sale of e-cigarette products;
- sell e-cigarette products from temporary outlets, sales trays and vending machines; and use e-cigarettes in public places that are currently smoke-free under the law, including in a motor vehicle if a child under the age of 16 years is present



## FROM THE INCLUSIVE EDUCATION CENTRE

### IEC 3

Term 1 has been an exciting start to the year in IEC3. We have collaborated as the Senior school class in the new building naming ourselves



In Cross-Curricular (Life Skills) we have been working on our 'Essential Agreement' class norms and taking ownership and responsibilities in the classroom.

After an excursion to the Co-Op, we set up our kitchen pantry to cook up a storm. The students cooked pancakes, hamburgers, cupcakes, and our classic café cheese and ham toasted sandwiches sided with hot chocolate with marshmallows!



We are working on designing our front classroom outdoor area to include a garden and a seat for caregivers; and a mosaic wall statement.

In ART students worked on a Unit of drawing 'Dogs in the community'. The focus was on Principles and Elements of Design, sketches, and colour prints.

Our highlight was the visit from the Dog Squad police dogs, which was enjoyed by all classes.



## From the Inclusive Education Centre - continued

In Agriculture, the students have prepared garden beds and planted seedlings that are now thriving! Our focus has been on farm and Ag area safety, healthy food linked to making pizza on pita bread, weather, seasons, soil, and modeling with clay. We walk to the Blue Gums and enjoy nature at its best with the natural habitats and quiet sanctuary. We have been observing the vineyard CRUSH and the meat bird growth and maintenance.

In Health and PE our focus has been on building confidence to participate in physical activity in small groups.


We have been improving our fundamental skills for catching and throwing while shooting hoops at the basketball court, team games and silent ball.

### Numeracy in Special Class

This term commenced with our class working on activities involving numbers and mental computation to demonstrate their prior knowledge and level of engagement in mathematics. The students were given assessments "Trust the Count" and "Place Value" over several weeks to determine forward challenges for differentiated learning needs.

Dice addition and subtraction, worksheets, flashcards, and hands-on activities with concrete materials have been focussed on number and place value.

Money has been the latest topic with a Monopoly challenge carrying over two weeks. The lessons have been fun and engaging with high level of negotiation and mathematical thinking.



Our visiting UNI SA Occupational Therapist students have been designing and facilitating recess and lunchtime activities.

The students have been working hard to create a sustainable sensory program to include a variety of activities that can be staff and student led to improve students gross and fine motor skills, social interactions and develop a variety of sensory needs.


### From the Special Class
