Principal update

As we move through another exciting term, we want to take a moment to connect with you, share important updates, and celebrate our students' achievements together.

We are delighted to have welcomed Adla Mattiske, our Deputy Principal for term 4, who started in week 1 of this term. Adla has seamlessly integrated into her role, bringing valuable expertise in attendance policy, middle school interventions, and transition support. She is actively reviewing and refining these areas to ensure our policies are clear and supportive.

Lachlan Fuss has also joined us as our new Youth Worker. His presence has already made a positive impact and our students have responded enthusiastically to his support within the school community.

This term, we introduced a trial of two 30-minute breaks which has received positive feedback, especially from Years 7-10 students. This change aims to enhance:

- Engagement and Positive Behaviour: Longer breaks allow students more time to rest and 21/11 recharge, leading to better focus in class
- Self-regulation: Extended recess provides opportunities for physical activity and relaxation, helping students manage their emotions
- Support Services: More structured check-ins with staff and wellbeing programs are available during breaks, benefitting students who need additional guidance
- Social Interactions: The change allows for extracurricular clubs to operate more flexibly, encouraging students to build relationships and foster a positive school environment

We will review this structure in the coming weeks to determine its continuation for 2025.

Term 4 at Nuriootpa High School is truly a term of many celebrations, reflecting the diverse achievements and milestones within our community. One of these occasions is World Teachers' Day, celebrated on October 25. On this day, we honoured our dedicated teaching team with a special morning tea, recognising their unwavering hard work and commitment to our students' success. Now is the time to claim ABSTUDY for your high school child



ABSTUDY is a group of payments for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians. ABSTUDY helps with the costs of studying or doing an Australian Apprenticeship.

It can help with your child's school fees, boarding costs, travel to and from school and other school items. If your child's travel is impacted by COVID-19 or they need to study remotely, ABSTUDY can also help.

If you're a parent or guardian and your child is younger than 16, you should claim on their behalf. If your child is 16 and over, or independent, they can claim themselves. To claim, call the Services Australia's ABSTUDY line on Freecall 1800 132 317.

If they're starting uni or TAFE, they'll be able to claim online through myGov.

Claiming before 1 December means ABSTUDY payments can be finalised in time for the start of school next year. This is very important if your child needs to move away from home to study.






YEAR 9 DRAWING AND PAINTING
















SAASTA CONNECT POWER CUP

YEAR 10 AGRICULTURE MT PLEASANT BUTCHER EXCURSION



On Friday 27th September, Mr Bottrall's Year 10 Livestock Class visited the Mount Pleasant Butcher. Students had just finished learning about beef production and meat quality, and this trip enabled them to cement their understanding of these topics. Jamie Hylan, owner of Mt Pleasant Butcher showed students how to break a beef carcase into the primal cuts and common beef cuts that are purchased from in a butcher shop. He also discussed MSA grading, butchery as a trade and work, the smallgoods aspect of his business, toured the facility and 70-year-old smoke houses that are still in operation. Students thoroughly enjoyed the trip (especially the beersticks and mettwurst), and we thank the team at Mount Pleasant Butcher for hosting us!

YEAR 8 AGRICULTURE CLASS HATCHES CHICKENS

This term, Year 8 students at Nuriootpa High School have been actively involved in hatching chickens as part of their Agriculture classes. Using an incubator, the students closely monitored the development of the eggs, learning about the various stages of growth and eagerly awaiting the chicks' arrival.

As part of the project, students also learned key aspects of poultry care, including feeding, maintaining living conditions, and ensuring the health of the chicks. This hands-on experience taught them about responsibility and animal welfare.

In addition, the classes have explored the Australian poultry industry, discussing topics such as the difference between layer and meat chicken breeds, the economic importance of poultry, and necessary biosecurity measures. This topic is continuing to provide students with practical skills and insights into the agricultural world.

YEAR 7 AGRICULTURE CLASS VISITS BAROSSA BUSHGARDENS

On Wednesday 23rd October, Mr Bottrall's and Mr Bowley's Year 7 Agriculture students visited the Barossa Bushgardens to explore Indigenous Australians' traditional uses of native plants. Guided by nursery staff and volunteers, students learned how plants like acacias, pigface, muntries, grass trees, and old man's beard plants have been used for food, medicine, and cultural practices over thousands of years.



Students enjoyed hands-on activities, identifying native plants and discussing their use in bush tucker.

They also learned about sustainable harvesting and land management techniques, such as firestick farming, which help preserve ecosystems.

This trip deepened students' appreciation for Indigenous knowledge and its relevance to sustainable agriculture, inspiring them to incorporate these practices and knowledge into their future projects.


