From the Principal

As 2024 comes to the end, it's important to celebrate the many successes of Nuriootpa High School.

Our school motto,

'Per Aspera Ad Astra'
meaning
'Through Adversity to the Stars'

has continued to guide us through opportunities and challenges. Our success has been strengthened by the partnerships we have with the students, families and the wider community. As a school community we have continued to strive to reach for the stars.

During 2024 we focused on our core business of teaching and learning, which has driven several key initiatives aimed at enhancing educational outcomes. We undertook a comprehensive review of assessments and task design to ensure they align with best practices and effectively measure student learning. Our staff familiarised themselves with the South Australian Curriculum, ensuring that our teaching strategies are both relevant and rigorous.

A significant effort was made to review and develop the Year 7 curriculum, tailoring it to meet the diverse needs of our students. This involved a focus on pedagogy, where teachers engaged in professional development to refine their instructional methods and foster a more engaging learning environment.

Additionally, we conducted a deep dive into data analysis to inform our curriculum practices. By examining student performance data, we identified areas for improvement and tailored our teaching approaches to better support student achievement. This data-driven approach has enabled us to make informed decisions that enhance the learning experience for all students.

Through these efforts, we continue to prioritise high-quality teaching and learning, ensuring that our students receive the best possible education and are well-prepared for future success.

We also continued the work in the department's Wellbeing Area of Impact being 'To enhance the safe, inclusive, and respectful school environment to ensure that everyone belongs, is valued and supported.'

This year, our school has made significant strides in enhancing a safe, inclusive, and respectful environment where everyone feels valued and supported. A key focus has been on building staff skills to effectively respond to bullying. Most of our staff completed online modules on bullying prevention, and two leaders have undergone Restorative Practices training. Plans are underway to extend this training to all staff along with Positive Behaviours for Learning training.

Staff collaborated with students and families to enhance the Student Development Program, ensuring it addresses bullying comprehensively. This year, Year 7 and 8 students engaged in kindness and empathy activities, while the curriculum also focused on emotions and self-regulation. The Wellbeing Team has been proactive in sourcing mental health resources to support students and families affected by bullying.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT CONTINUED

External providers like Dolly's Dream and the Carly Ryan Foundation have been engaged to deliver targeted programs for different year levels, including parent workshops. Additionally, the UPLIFT Program has been introduced for selected Year 7 and 8 students, fostering personal development and resilience. Year 9 students participated in a performance by Brainstorm Productions, addressing bullying and aggression, while Year 10 students engaged in the Power to End Violence Against Women program.

To facilitate safe reporting of bullying, the SRC Working Party developed a digital incident report form. This form allows students to report a range of issues, not just bullying, and is nearing release after thorough consultation. Our commitment to creating a supportive school environment remains steadfast.

Through out the year, the students have actively demonstrated our school values of tradition, relationships and excellence. They are excellent ambassadors in the community and within the state. When our students had the opportunity to represent our school, they did so with pride and dignity. We continue to build on the solid foundations of our school and ensure that we provide positive educational experiences for all students. Having a school that includes an Inclusive Education Centre and a Flexible Learning Centre contributes to the richness of these experiences.

Our students have continued to excel in their academic studies, sport, music, the arts and extracurricular activities. They also have the opportunities afforded by being a Specialist Music school. These successes do not happen without the strong commitment of our staff who contribute generously to the rich fabric of our school.

The Student Representative Council have been outstanding again this year. Their leadership and contributions have added greatly to our school. They have continued to show leadership in a range of ways. It has been a privilege to work with them when needing advice and feedback on school issues – they have always been prepared to stand up and represent their peers in a constructive and positive manner.
