Positive Behaviours for Learning (PBL)

Positive Behaviours for Learning is a whole-school approach to behaviour expectations and responses that focuses on promoting behaviours conducive to learning.

Trauma-informed practice, such as the Berry Street Education Model (BSEM) indicates that having a **safe and predictable** school environment is paramount to student learning and achievement. We have prioritised this as our immediate work for the start of this year.

Our Respectful Behaviour Procedure has been updated and uploaded on the school website, see a link on our <u>school website</u>. This update has occurred with a review and also engaging a Behaviour Coach from Support Services, DfE. We look forward to engaging our student and parent/caregiver community further as we roll-out PBL.

Building-up our School

A number of significant building and infrastructure projects are planned, ready to start or underway. Significant works slated for this year include:

Basketball courts major upgrade and resurface

Memorial Hall Toilet block demolition and individual cubicle re-build

New staff car-park to minimise congestion

FINANCE REPORT

This year's Material and Service charge of \$510 less the \$200 Government Rebate for 2025, which will include any students subject fees, these invoices will be hitting mail boxes by the end of week 4 so don't forget to check your mailboxes or PO Boxes. Remember you can make payment arrangements to help break the cost down.

The M&S Charge will be due to be paid 14th March 2025. If you have an arrangement to pay by 3 instalments: - the first instalment of \$137 will be due on Friday 14th March, \$137 due on Friday 11th April and \$136 due Friday 9th May.

Or for Individual Payment plan – please contact the finance office if you wish to arrange a payment plan for weekly, fortnightly or monthly payments.

If you are unsure of your eligibility and require further assistance please contact the Finance Office. If you are found to be ineligible for School Card then you are liable to pay the full amount of Materials & Services Charge.

When making payments to NHS bank account for M&S fees or other invoiced amounts please remember to use the invoice number or family code as the reference.


CANTEEN ONLINE ORDERING – SPRIGGY SCHOOLS

Overview of SRC

The SRC is compiled of elected students from each year level. Years 8-12 form a homegroup which is support by 2 teachers (Mr. Hall & Mrs. Tsakiris in 2025). Students nominate and are voted in by their specific year levels. Five year 7's will be included in the SRC in term 2, with nominations occurring towards the end of Term 1. 


